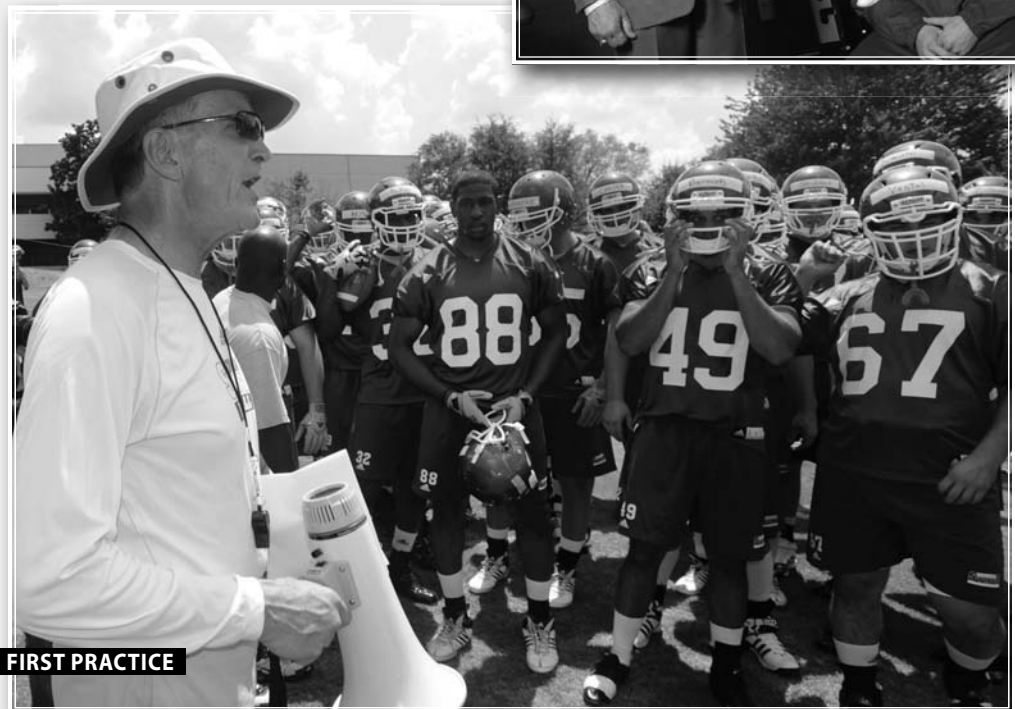

SUN BELT CONFERENCE

After more than a year's worth of anticipation, the wait is finally over. On July 1, 2013, the Georgia State Athletic Department officially became a full member of the Sun Belt Conference and will now compete for championships in 14 league-sponsored sports starting this fall.

"We look forward to playing a leadership role in the Sun Belt Conference and our teams competing for Sun Belt titles and postseason berths," Director of Athletics Cheryl L. Levick said. "It really is a tremendous day in Georgia State sports history."

GSU's move onto a national stage in all sports officially began on April 9, 2012. At a press conference inside the Georgia Dome, Sun Belt Conference officials joined Georgia State President Mark Becker and Levick at the public announcement of the Panthers' impending conference move.

A feasibility study begun in the fall of 2011 concluded the Panthers were well positioned to make the jump to the FBS level and that the Sun Belt would be an ideal fit. The rest has been history. The move now allows GSU to build on regional rivalries with several schools within driving distance, while also showcasing its talented teams to the country.

It is a return home of sorts for Georgia State, which was a founding member of the Sun Belt Conference in 1976. At that time, the league consisted of six universities playing across four men's sports – basketball, soccer, tennis and golf.

Today, the Sun Belt Conference sponsors 18 sports, including 14 that the Panthers will vie for conference titles. On the men's side, GSU will compete in baseball, basketball, football, golf and tennis, while women's sports include basketball, golf, cross country, soccer, softball, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and court volleyball. GSU has also announced plans to add women's swimming and diving, another Sun Belt-sponsored sport.

The Panthers already own two Sun Belt Conference titles in the past year. Ten individual sports were accepted into the league for 2012-13, giving the women's cross country and men's tennis teams a leg up on collecting hardware. Each squad won the Sun Belt title and helped Georgia State finish ahead of two SBC schools in the 2012-13 Vic Bubas Cup standings (an all sports trophy) despite competing in only half of the league's sports.

ABOUT SUN BELT CONFERENCE FOOTBALL

The Sun Belt Conference will contest the 2013 football season with eight members – Arkansas State, Georgia State, Louisiana-Lafayette, Louisiana-Monroe, South Alabama, Texas State, Troy and Western Kentucky. UALR and UT Arlington compete as non-football members.

Come the 2014 season, the Sun Belt will have four new members in the league as Appalachian State and Georgia Southern were added as all-sports members and Idaho and New Mexico State have been added as football playing members.

For the first time in the Sun Belt Conference’s 12 years of football the league sent four teams to postseason bowl games in 2012. Louisiana-Lafayette played in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl , WKU headed to the Little Caesars Pizza Bowl, Louisiana-Monroe traveled west to the AdvoCare V100 Independence Bowl and league champion Arkansas State returned to the GoDaddy.com Bowl.

League-champion Arkansas State defeated No. 25 Kent State in the GoDaddy.com Bowl 17-13 and Louisiana-Lafayette won its second consecutive R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl with a 43-34 victory over Conference USA’s East Carolina.

The conference finished with its most non-conference wins in league history in 2012 and also posted its best ever average computer ranking in 2012 – finishing ahead of Conference USA and the Mountain West.

The league had two wins over top-25 ranked opponents and two bowl victories in 2012.

Over the last five years the Sun Belt Conference ranks sixth out of the 11 FBS conferences in postseason bowl game winning percentage. In fact, the Sun Belt Conference ranks ahead of noted “BCS AQ” leagues – the ACC, Pac-12 and the Big Ten.

The SBC has won four consecutive R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl games and six out of the last seven New Orleans Bowls against opponents from C-USA, the Mid-American Conference and the MWC.

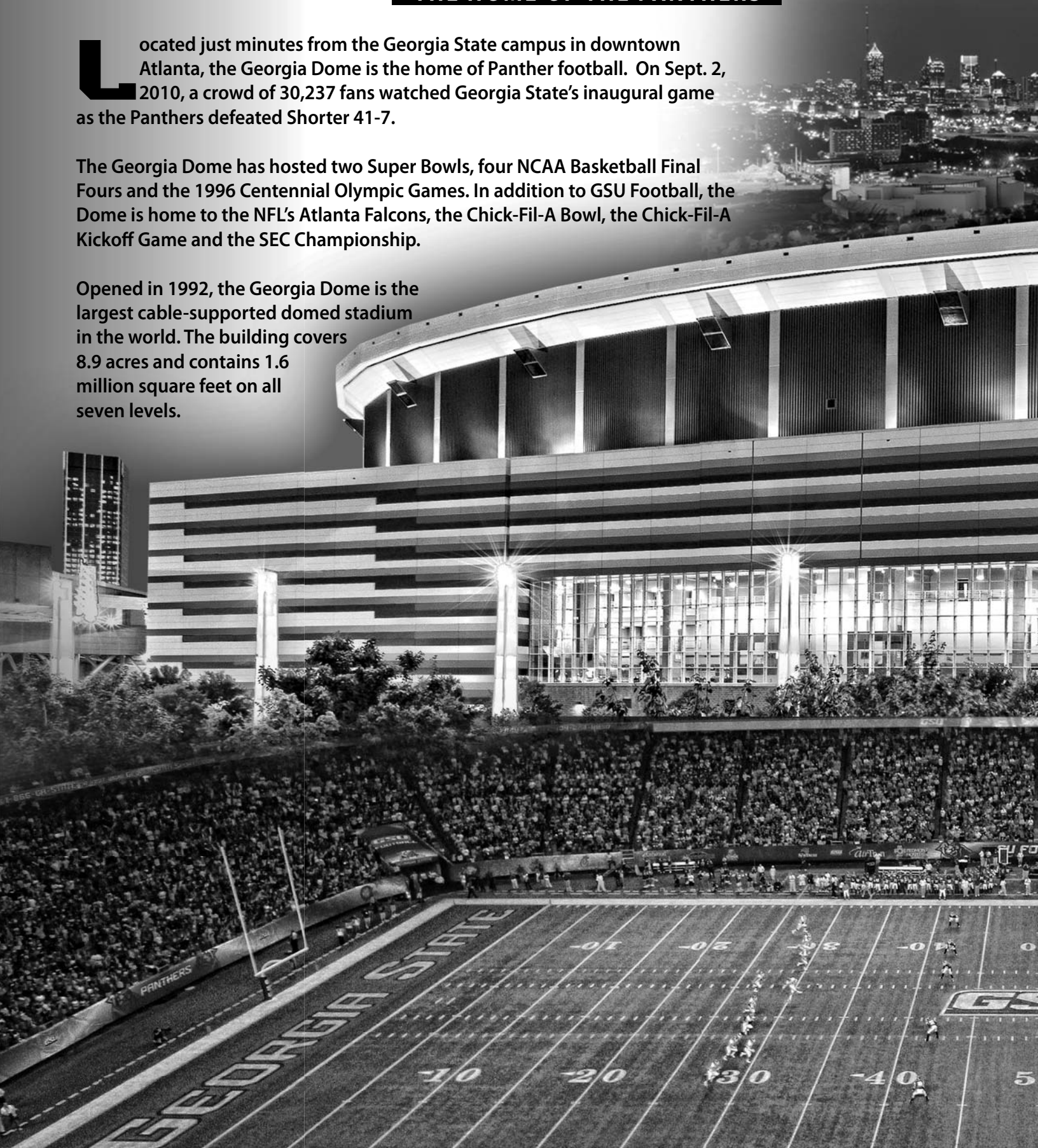
GEORGIA DOME

THE HOME OF THE PANTHERS

Located just minutes from the Georgia State campus in downtown Atlanta, the Georgia Dome is the home of Panther football. On Sept. 2, 2010, a crowd of 30,237 fans watched Georgia State's inaugural game as the Panthers defeated Shorter 41-7.

The Georgia Dome has hosted two Super Bowls, four NCAA Basketball Final Fours and the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games. In addition to GSU Football, the Dome is home to the NFL's Atlanta Falcons, the Chick-Fil-A Bowl, the Chick-Fil-A Kickoff Game and the SEC Championship.

Opened in 1992, the Georgia Dome is the largest cable-supported domed stadium in the world. The building covers 8.9 acres and contains 1.6 million square feet on all seven levels.



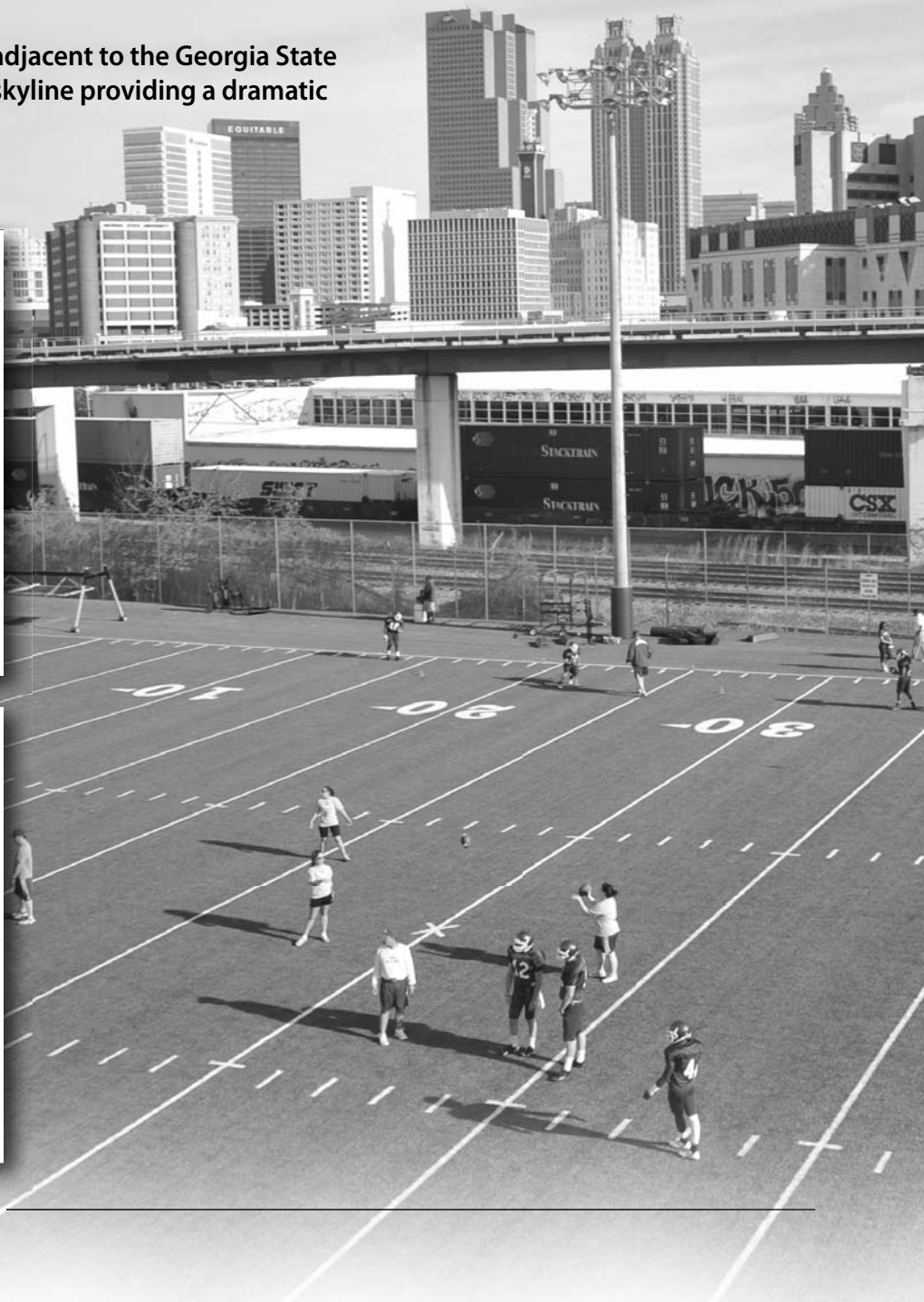


GSMU PRACTICE COMPLEX

The GSMU Practice Complex houses the football program on a daily basis. The complex features a 120-yard synthetic turf field, completed in March 2010, as well as a 60-yard natural turf field.

An existing structure on the site was renovated and expanded, maintaining its historic architecture and charm while adding modern features. The 22,000-square foot facility was completed in 2011 and includes the Panthers' locker room, equipment room, athletic training room, theater-style team meeting room, individual position meeting rooms and coaches' offices.

The GSMU Practice Complex is located adjacent to the Georgia State campus, with the downtown Atlanta skyline providing a dramatic backdrop.





GEORGIA STATE UNIVERSITY

Georgia State University is a leading urban research university, educating Georgia's most diverse student population.

With an enrollment of more than 32,000 students, it is the second largest institution in the University System of Georgia. Students arrive from every county in Georgia, every state in the nation and more than 150 countries.

Georgia State offers educational opportunities for traditional and nontraditional students at both the graduate and undergraduate levels by blending the best of theoretical and applied inquiry, scholarly and professional pursuits, and scientific and artistic expression.

With strong disciplinary-based departments and a wide array of problem-oriented interdisciplinary programs, the goal of the university is to develop, transmit, and utilize knowledge in order to provide access to quality education for diverse groups of students, to educate leaders for the State of Georgia and the nation, and to prepare citizens for lifelong learning in a global society.

Georgia State was founded in 1913 and celebrates its Centennial in 2013. MARK P. BECKER

GSU PRESIDENT

Since beginning his tenure as Georgia State University's seventh president in January 2009, President Mark P. Becker has provided a vision for the future of Georgia State University and led the institution into a period of marked growth and advancement.

Reflecting his vision of the urban public research university for the 21st century, the university adopted a dynamic 10-year strategic plan that has Georgia State well on its way to becoming one of the nation's premier urban research universities.

As a first generation college student who began his educational career at a community college, Becker is personally and professionally committed to ensuring that students of all economic backgrounds succeed and are given opportunities to compete on a level playing field. Under his leadership, Georgia State's graduation rate has already increased by 10 percent, and the university is becoming a national model for undergraduate education. It leads the nation in eliminating disparities in graduation rates based on race or ethnicity, and, as one of the most diverse universities in America, is first in the nation among non-profit institutions in graduating African-American students.

By promoting the achievements of the university, making it more visible locally and nationally, and demonstrating the value of a Georgia State degree, the university under Becker's leadership has set a series of university records for enrollment, graduation rates and total graduates. Becker has also placed high priority on ensuring financial support for students, and as a result need- and merit-based scholarship funds distributed by the university have tripled since his arrival.

Becker's passion for student success has been matched by his commitment to increasing multidisciplinary research and economic development as facilitated by the creation of new research centers, the Second Century Initiative—an ambitious program to hire one-hundred senior faculty members to serve in interdisciplinary research clusters, and an enhanced emphasis on the translation of faculty research into products and companies. This commitment has brought the university to new heights of research accomplishment, as reflected, for example, in new university records for sponsored research funding and federal research funding.

Being globally connected and engaged is another important component of Becker's

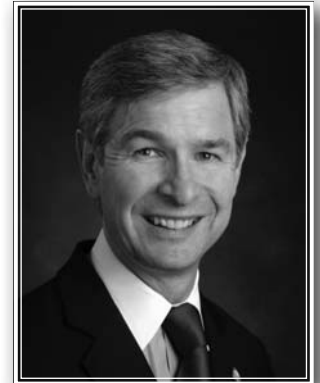
vision for the modern research university. Seeking to position Georgia State faculty and students to thrive in an increasingly complex and global landscape, Becker has worked with faculty leaders and international partners to enhance Georgia State's global profile. In 2010 the university partnered with Beijing Language and Culture University to establish a Confucius Institute with an emphasis on business and commerce. In 2012 the institute was named a "2012 Confucius Institute of the Year."

Becker is particularly committed to developing strong partnerships with universities in rapidly growing economies. As a result, the university is working to strengthen relationships with counterparts in Brazil, China, South Africa, South Korea and Turkey. These partners are the basis for the development of new student and faculty exchanges, study abroad programs, research collaborations, executive training initiatives, government and private sector networks, and dual-degree programs.

Becker has aggressively advanced the campus' physical development and revitalization of downtown Atlanta. This has included major additions to campus housing and dining, research and academic facilities, as well as intramural and athletics facilities. In 2010 the university added football to its athletics program, and in 2013 added sand volleyball and moved to the Sun Belt Conference to advance into the Division I – FBS level of NCAA competition.

Throughout his career Becker has served on boards and committees of civic, government and professional bodies. He serves, for example, on the boards of the Coalition of Urban Serving Universities, World Affairs Council of Atlanta, Georgia Chamber of Commerce, Georgia Aquarium, Georgia Research Alliance, Woodruff Arts Center, and the Atlanta Committee for Progress. He also serves on the executive committees of the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce, Atlanta Regional Council for Higher Education (Chair) and Central Atlanta Progress.

Trained as a statistician, Becker has had a distinguished career in biostatistics and public



health sciences. For most of his professorial career he was a member of the faculty in the Department of Biostatistics at the University of Michigan, where he also held appointments in the Institute for Social Research, and the Department of Statistics. He was made a Fellow of the American Statistical Association, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Becker has been principal investigator on research grants from the National Institutes of Health and the National Science Foundation. He has published extensively in leading journals, and his doctoral students have gone on to successful careers in leading higher education institutions and with multinational companies. Becker served on multiple editorial boards, was co-editor of *Sociological Methodology*, and was a guest editor for *Sociological Methods and Research* and for the *Journal of the American Statistical Association*.

Prior to his appointment as president of Georgia State, Becker was executive vice president for academic affairs and provost at the University of South Carolina and dean of the School of Public Health and assistant vice president of Public Health Preparedness and Emergency Response at the University of Minnesota. From 1989 to 2000, Becker was a professor in the University of Michigan's School of Public Health, where he also was associate dean for academic affairs. He has held academic appointments at the University of Washington, the University of Florida and Cornell University.

Becker attended Harford (Md.) Community College, earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics from Towson State University in 1980 and his Ph.D. degree in statistics from the Pennsylvania State University in 1985. Becker grew up in Havre de Grace, Md., near Baltimore. He and his wife, Laura Voisinet, have two adult children, Matthew and Julia.

CHERYL L. LEVICK

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



A highly respected administrator with over two decades of experience guiding programs to the highest level of NCAA play, Cheryl L. Levick has successfully combined athletic and educational opportunities for students since the start of her career in collegiate athletics.

As Georgia State's Director of Athletics, Levick has helped boost the Panthers' visibility on the national stage in multiple sports while adhering to the athletic department's mission statement of shaping champions for today and leaders for tomorrow.

The transformation of the Panther Athletics Department has been remarkable under Levick. Each program has been enhanced or in the case of football, built from scratch – the program had one player, two helmets and seven coaches when she arrived in 2009. Now it is set to compete at the FBS level in just its fourth season. To make that jump in schedule and talent, Levick hired Trent Miles away from his alma mater in December 2012 after he constructed an impressive – if not totally improbable – turnaround at Indiana State.

Miles was not the first high-level coaching hire Levick successfully maneuvered for the Panthers as she also plucked Ron Hunter out of the state of Indiana in 2011. He quickly revitalized Georgia State basketball with its first postseason berth in a decade in his first year, and now has Panther fans eagerly awaiting the 2013-14 campaign.

The significant imprint Levick has created at GSU can be seen across the entire athletic department. She has put Georgia State in position to compete for league titles right off the bat as it fully moves into the Sun Belt Conference in 2013-14. Last year, GSU squads won two SBC team crowns to put the conference on notice that the Panthers are not just

moving up, but they are ready to win from the start.

Levick's tenure in sport-crazy Atlanta has been marked by significant upgrades in facilities and fundraising. Annual giving to the Panther Athletic Club (PAC) has steadily increased by more than tenfold, and the three largest gifts in the history of GSU athletics have been secured. Construction projects have included the GSU Football Practice Complex, new facilities for strength and conditioning and sports medicine, and upgrades to every venue used by the Panthers.

Arguably the most impressive project to date is the state-of-the-art facility for sand volleyball, the Panthers' most recent sport addition. It was finished in time for the inaugural season in 2013, and is part of the ambitious Athletics Master Facilities Plan that Levick developed to address needs for every sport.

Continuous success has been seen in the classroom as Georgia State student-athletes have excelled in recent years. Together, Panther student-athletes have recorded a cumulative grade-point average above 3.0 for 10 consecutive semesters while completing more than 5,000 hours of community service annually.

Levick has been a significant proponent of providing opportunities for women in college sports. She started the Women, Sports and Power Luncheon to raise money for women's sports by female donors, an event that has been successful at each of her previous stops as athletic director. The event helped raise \$50,000 for GSU women's teams in 2013.

In 2011, Levick was named a "Game Changer" among women in sports business by the SportsBusiness Journal, and she was twice (1998 and 1999) named one of the nation's Top 25 Female Sports Executives by Street & Smith's SportsBusiness Journal. The National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators (NACWAA) also named her Division I Athletic Administrator of the Year in 2001.

Levick came to Georgia State from Maryland, where she served as chief of staff/executive senior athletic director while overseeing the day-to-day management of the 27-sport program. That came after serving three years (2004-07) as director of athletics at Saint Louis, where she led the Billikens' transition to the Atlantic 10 Conference and was the lead fundraiser for an \$80 million on-campus arena and practice complex.

In four years (2000-04) as director of athletics and recreation at Santa Clara, Levick oversaw a major renovation of the school's basketball arena and saw the Broncos' women's soccer team capture the 2001 national championship. It is still the only NCAA team title in school history.

Levick spent 12 years at Stanford as senior associate athletic director and senior woman administrator. She was the primary administrator for 33 varsity programs that won 44 national championships and helped Stanford to six straight Sears Cup titles. She also served as assistant commissioner of the Pac-10 Conference, assistant director of communications and women's programs at the NCAA, women's gymnastics coach and associate athletic director at Slippery Rock, and assistant gymnastics coach and synchronized swim coach at Indiana. Levick began her career at Pattonville Senior High School in St. Louis, Mo., coaching gymnastics and women's track.

Levick is a 1974 graduate of Missouri and holds a master's degree in athletic administration from Indiana. She has two daughters: Heather, who is married to Michael Klass, and Melissa, who will marry Jason Lake in August 2013.

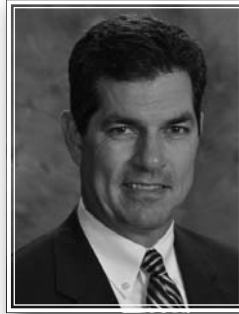

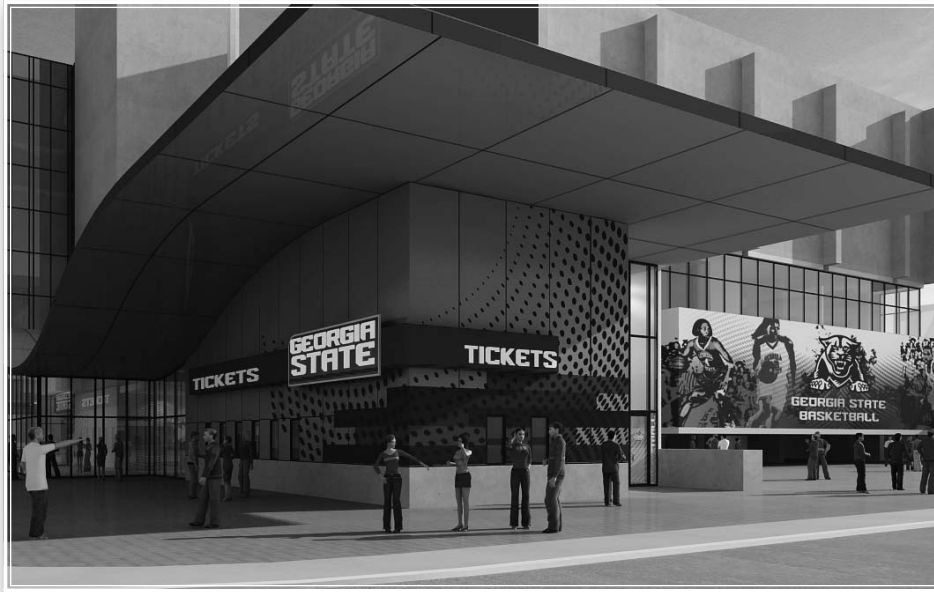

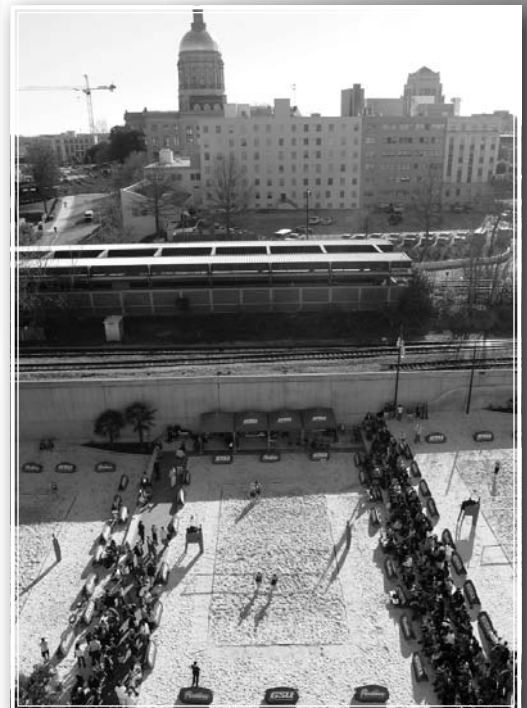
An institution on the rise, Georgia State University has a tradition of progress that is reflected in its rising stature, growing campus and broadening influence.

The Sand Volleyball Complex (far right), opened in 2013. The Master Plan also includes new venues for baseball (right), softball, soccer and court volleyball.



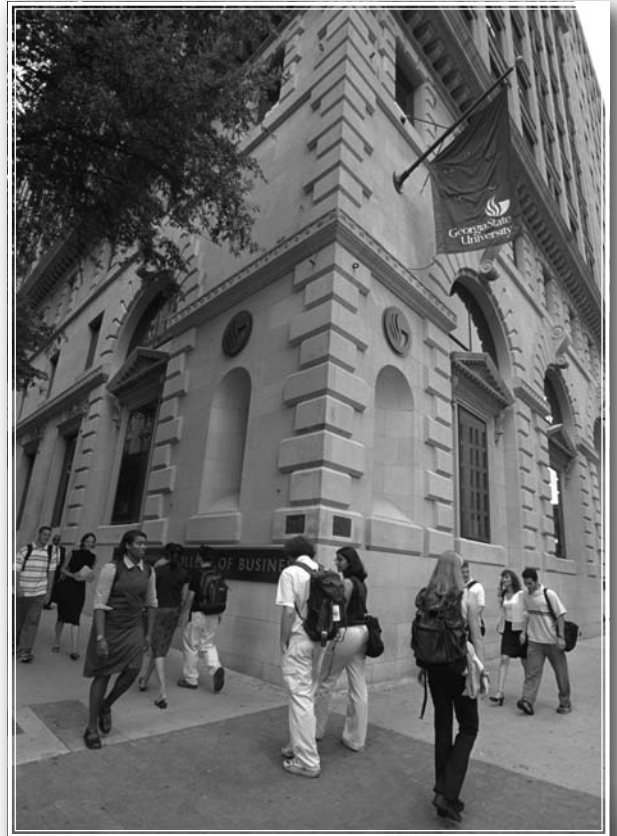

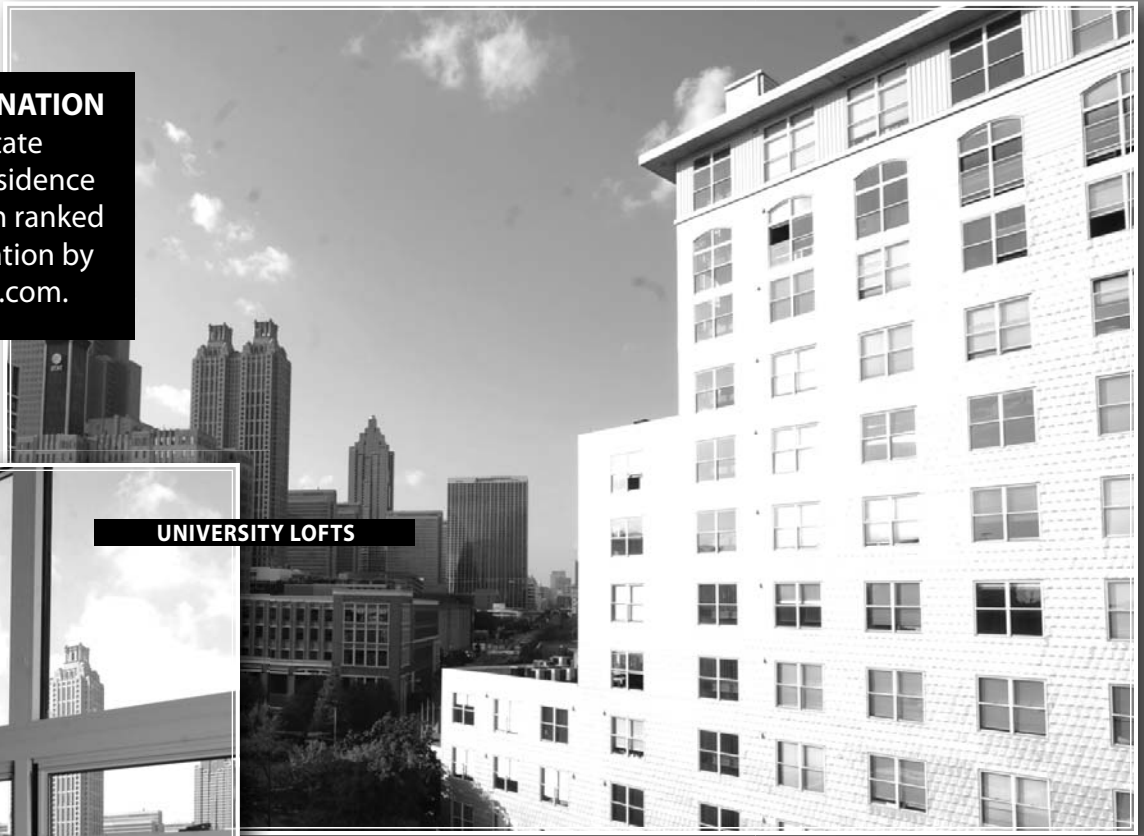
The University Lofts, opened in 2002, contain fully-furnished, loft-style apartments that blend urban style with modern features.

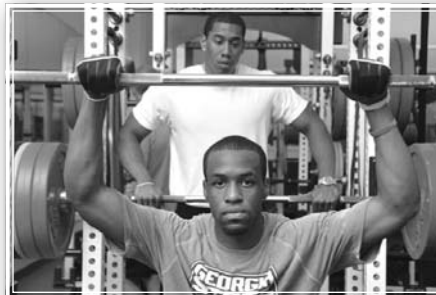

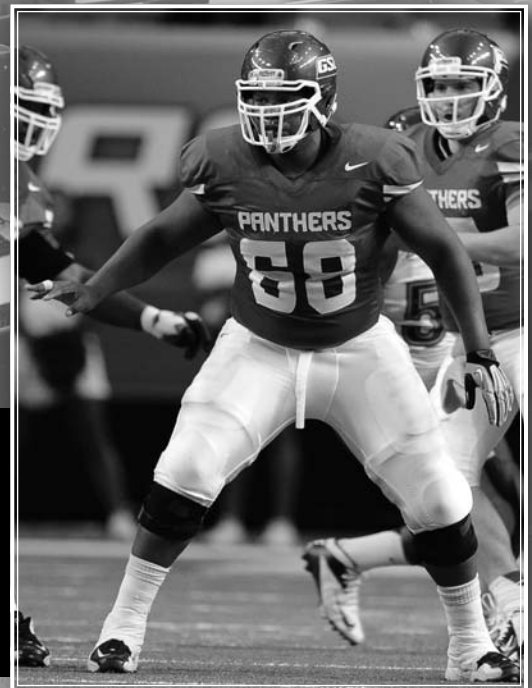

POSITION-BY-POSITION LOOK AT THE PANTHERS

Georgia State's fourth season of football is also a year of firsts for the Panthers, who will play their inaugural season at the FBS level and in the Sun Belt Conference under first-year head coach Trent Miles.

Miles, who executed a remarkable turnaround in five seasons at Indiana State, looks to build a winning foundation for GSU's fledgling program, which only began play in 2010.

The Panthers return 44 letterwinners, including nine starters on offense, eight on defense and their punter and place-kicker. The 2013 schedule is daunting, to say the least, as Georgia State makes trips to defending national champion Alabama and West Virginia in addition to the Sun Belt slate.

QUARTERBACKS

The Panthers enter the preseason with a three-way battle for the starting job between sophomores Ben McLane and Ronnie Bell and newcomer Clay Chastain, a transfer from Georgia Military College. McLane and Bell manned the position last year, but both struggled with consistency and turnovers.

McLane, a 6-1, 210-pounder from Snellville, Ga., and Brookwood High School, started nine of 11 games last fall and passed for 1,592 yards and 10 touchdowns but threw 11 interceptions.

Another local product who was a two-time state champion at Sandy Creek High School, Bell passed for 522 yards and three touchdowns in seven games but tossed 10 picks.

Chastain enrolled at GSU in January after one season at GMC. At 6-4 and 218 pounds, he has the size and arm strength to quarterback the Panthers' pro-style attack as he continues to develop and learn the system.

RUNNING BACKS

Georgia State has big shoes to fill in the backfield with the graduation of Donald Russell, who rushed for 1,412 yards and 12 touchdowns over the last two seasons. The leading rusher in GSU history signed a free agent contract with the Atlanta Falcons.

Gerald Howse, a transfer from Northeastern Oklahoma A&M who enrolled at GSU last January, looks to earn the starting berth at running back. A big back at 6-2 and 215 pounds, he rushed for 652 yards and 10 touchdowns as a sophomore at NEO.

Georgia State returns fifth-year senior Travis Evans, who rushed for 323 yards and two touchdowns as Russell's backup last season. He is the second-leading rusher in school history with 1,095 career yards.

Several other backup candidates return for the Panthers, including junior Rendell Wilder, and walk-ons Dontavis Crocker and Duvall Smith.

True freshman Kyler Neal from Dallas, Ga., and East Paulding High School could make an impact at running back. Another freshman, Jonathan Jean-Bart, enrolled in January but is recovering from a knee injury.

SEASON PREVIEW

The Panthers did not utilize a fullback in their first three seasons, but new offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski has two-back sets in his scheme. Junior Sean Jeppesen, a tight end and special teams standout last fall, is the likely candidate to line up at fullback as a lead blocker.

WIDE RECEIVERS

The wide receiver position features the Panthers' top playmaker in senior Albert Wilson, a preseason All-Sun Belt Conference selection after earning All-CAA honors a year ago. The 5-9, 200-pound senior is the leading receiver in GSU history with 104 catches for 2,013 yards and 15 touchdowns in the Panthers' first three seasons. He has averaged nearly 20 yards per catch, and seven of 15 touchdown catches are 50 yards or longer. Expect the multi-talented Wilson to line up all over the field as the Panthers look for ways to get him the ball.

Complementing Wilson are a pair of fifth-year seniors in Danny Williams and Jordan Giles, who both had very productive freshman and sophomore seasons before injuries in 2013.

Williams has 104 career receptions for 1,361 yards, including at least one catch in each of Georgia State's first 23 games before injuries derailed his 2013 season. He played in 10 games, catching 20 passes for 227 yards and one touchdown, but he was hampered throughout the year.

Giles was limited to just two catches and two games before season-ending shoulder surgery. He had 33 receptions and six touchdowns in his first two seasons.

A wild card is senior Kelton Hill, a former quarterback who will work at receiver, where his speed and athletic ability give him big-play potential. Hill caught 11 passes for 96 yards in part-time duty at wide receiver in 2012.

Sophomore Avery Sweeting is a potential deep threat with good speed. Adding depth are junior Lynquez Blair (10 receptions for 101 yards in 2012) and seniors Darren McCray (seven career receptions for 83 yards and a 96-yard kickoff return) and Parris Lee, who moved from running back in the spring. Junior Nathaniel Minor (7 receptions for 59 yards in 2012) is expected to miss the season after a spring knee injury.

True freshmen Robert Davis and Tyshaun Clemmons could make an impact.

TIGHT ENDS

One of the two offensive starters the Panthers lost to graduation is at tight end, where Emmanuel Ogbuehi had 25 receptions and three touchdowns a year ago but is now with the Washington Redskins.

Junior Drew Pearson is Georgia State's top returnee at tight end. He is a solid blocker but had just five catches for 39 yards last fall, although he also took some snaps at defensive end when injuries decimated the defensive line.

There is little depth behind Pearson, meaning the Panthers will likely look for contributions from their freshman class, which includes tight ends Keith Rucker, Bill Teknipp and Sebastian Willer.

OFFENSIVE LINE

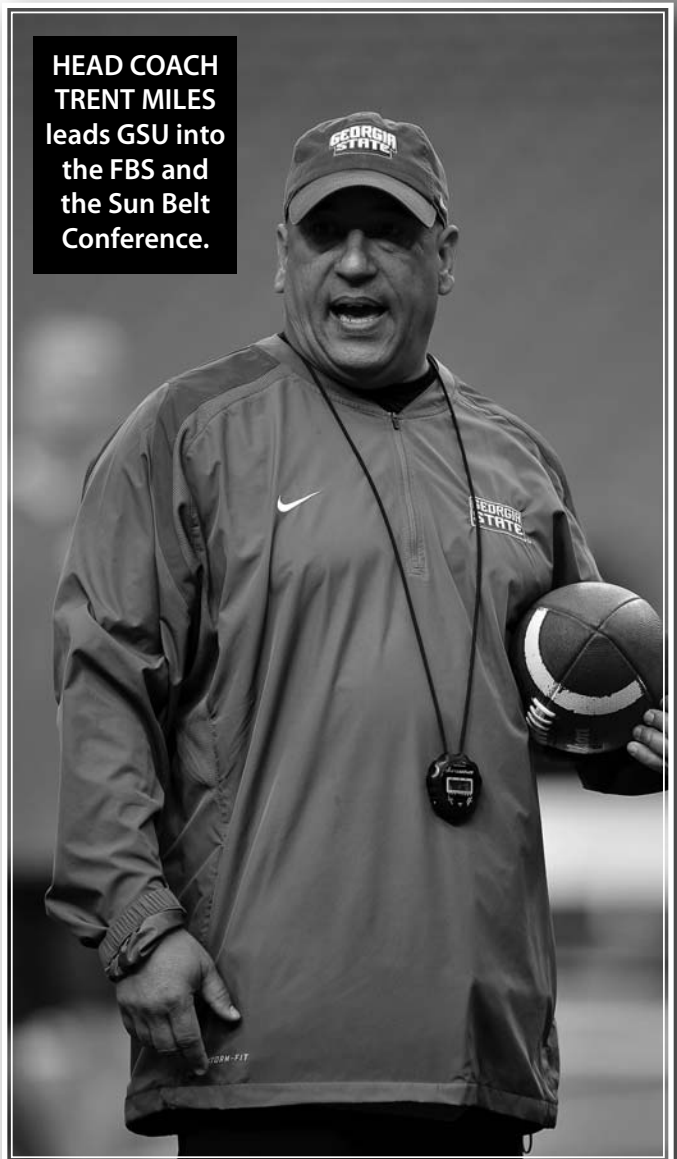
Georgia State returns all five starters on the offensive line with a veteran quintet that includes four seniors and one junior, led by senior tackle Ulrick John.

Standing 6-8 and 280 pounds with good movement and athletic ability, John mans the left tackle position, although he has also started games at guard and center in his career.

At right tackle is fifth-year senior Grant King, a 6-5, 295-pounder who is the only player to start every game of Georgia State's first three seasons. King was a third-team all-conference selection by Phil Steele's College Football Preview.

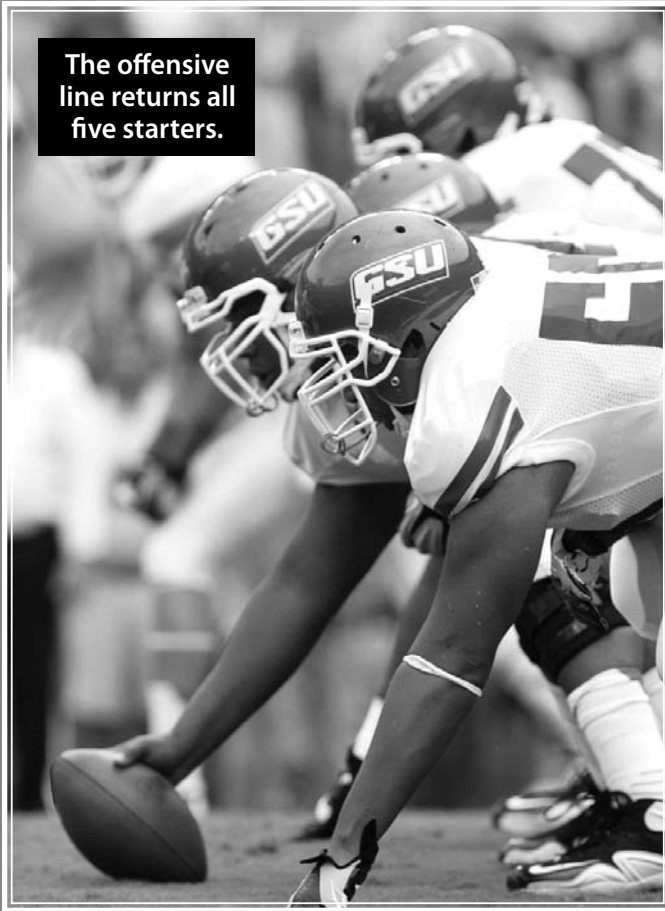
Another fifth-year senior, Ramell Davis, is the top backup at tackle, along with senior Nick Nesmith.

SEASON PREVIEW

The offensive line returns all five starters.



The returning starters at guard are junior Tim Wynn on the left side and senior Harrison Clottey at right guard. Another senior, Cade Yates, is an experienced backup. Redshirt freshman Garrett Gorringer showed promise in the spring, although he could also play tackle.

At center, the Panthers return fifth-year senior Michael Davis, an academic all-district selection last fall. Davis missed all of the 2010 campaign and most of 2011 with major injuries but returned to start 10 of 11 games in 2012.

Behind Davis is junior Ronald Martin and promising redshirt freshman Mark Ruskell, who is recovering from a spring injury.

Georgia State's crop of newcomers includes four offensive linemen in junior college transfer A.J. Kaplan and freshmen Davis Moore, Brandon Pertile and Daniel Zeigler, any of whom could put themselves in position to earn playing time.

DEFENSIVE LINE

The Panthers have three returning starters up front in seniors Terrance Woodard, Theo Agnew and John Kelly.

A stout presence in the middle at 6-4 and 295 pounds, Woodard was Georgia State's MVP on defense a year ago, when he collected 59 tackles, 2.5 tackles for loss, two pass breakups

and a fumble recovery. He enters 2013 as a preseason All-Sun Belt selection by Phil Steele's College Football Preview and College Sports Madness.

Agnew, a 6-4, 280-pound transfer from UMass, began the season at defensive end but moved inside for most of the year. He was the team's second-leading tackler with 60 with a team-high eight tackles for loss.

The 6-4, 275-pound Delic joins the mix this fall after sitting out last season and is expected to make an immediate impact.

Adding depth on the interior are sophomore Joe Lockley, perhaps the strongest player on the team who has showed promise but been slowed by injuries, and sophomore David Huey, another promising talent who suffered a season-ending injury after just two games last fall. Junior Marcus Stetzer made 20 tackles last year in a backup role.

SEASON PREVIEW

George Rogers, a junior college transfer from Northeastern Oklahoma A&M who enrolled for spring practice, should further bolster the interior line.

Kelly started every game of 2012 at defensive end, collecting 33 tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss and two sacks. He will play a hybrid defensive end-outside linebacker position in the Panthers' new scheme. His likely backup is sophomore Melvin King, who played in nine games as a true freshman last fall.

Other options on the defensive line include redshirt freshman Tanner Strickland and walk-on Terry Hollingshed. Defensive line prospects make up the largest portion of GSU's freshman class, including Mackendy Cheridor, Will Cunningham, Carnell Hopson, Tevin Jones, Jalen Lawrence and Shawayne Lawrence.

LINEBACKERS

Georgia State's top returnees at linebacker are senior Robert Ferguson, junior Jarrell Robinson and sophomore Joseph Peterson.

Ferguson, a 6-1, 230-pounder from Belle Glade, Fla., leads all active Panthers with 129 career tackles and 11 tackles for loss, and he is one of just two returnees, along with tackle Grant King, to play in every game of Georgia State's first three seasons.

Peterson is a talented young player who was thrown into the fire last fall as a true freshman, when he led the team in tackles with 65

Another option is senior Allen McKay, who has played linebacker in his career but saw time last season as an undersized defensive end to ease depth problems there.

At outside linebacker, the Panthers hope to have sophomore Tarris Batiste, a transfer from Indiana State who is awaiting an appeal to the NCAA to gain immediate eligibility. Sophomore Bryan Williams gained experience as a true freshman last fall, playing in eight games, including one start.

The freshman class includes promising linebackers Kight Dallas, Trey Payne and Jameel Spencer.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

At cornerback, the Panthers return three seniors who have started over the last three seasons in Brent McClendon, Demarius Matthews and Jamal Ransby. That trio has combined for 232 tackles and seven interceptions in Georgia State's first three campaigns. McClendon is the top performer with 114 career tackles, the fourth-highest total in GSU history, along with three interceptions and nine pass breakups.

A fourth senior cornerback, Nate Anthony, is a special teams standout who can also contribute in the secondary.

The safety position was hard hit by graduation with the loss of starters Demazio Skelton and D'Mario Gunn, who combined for nine interceptions over the last two seasons.

The most experienced returnee at safety is senior Kail Singleton, who had 43 tackles, an interception and a fumble recovery in nine games last fall. Also returning are Arington Jordan, Rashad Stewart, Robert Smith and Jamaal May.

Secondary prospects in the freshman class include Robert Dowling, Trent Hill and Tyshaun Clemmons, who could play wide receiver or defensive back. Cornerback Bruce Dukes will sit out the 2013 season after transferring from UCF.

SPECIALISTS

The Panthers return five key specialists, led by a pair of all-conference honorees in punter Matt Hubbard and return specialist Albert Wilson.

Hubbard, a junior from Peachtree City, Ga., is coming off an all-conference season as a sophomore, when he averaged 43.1 yards per punt with 21 boots of 50 yards or longer. He enters 2013 as a preseason All-Sun Belt Conference pick by Phil Steele's College Football Preview and Athlon.

Wil Lutz, a sophomore, took over the place-kicking chores midway through last season. He was a perfect 18-of-18 on extra points and 4-of-7 on field goals, with his three misses coming from 48 yards or longer.

Junior David Miller is a versatile backup who can punt, kick off or handle placements.

Senior long-snapper Scott McQueen also returns. He has been the long-snapper for every field goal and extra point of the Panthers' first three seasons, and he added punt duties in 2012.

Wilson, also an all-conference wide receiver, was the Co-Special Teams Player of the Year in the CAA last fall. He has averaged 25.1 yards per return for his career, including a 97-yard touchdown return at Alabama in 2010 and a 100-yard scoring return last season versus Old Dominion.

TRENT MILES HEAD COACH

Trent Miles, who engineered a dramatic turnaround in five seasons at Indiana State, is the new head football coach at Georgia State.

Miles, the 2012 Region Four Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association, was officially introduced by GSU President Mark Becker and Director of Athletics Cheryl L. Levick on Dec. 3, 2012.

A former assistant coach at Stanford, Notre Dame and Washington, Miles takes the helm of the GSU program following the retirement of Bill Curry, the program's head coach since its inception in 2008. After completing its third season of play in 2012, Georgia State moves to the Sun Belt Conference in 2013, which will mark the second and final year of the program's transition to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS).

Despite taking over a struggling Indiana State program that had won just one game in the three seasons before his arrival in 2008, Miles led the Sycamores to

winning records the last three years.

In 2010, he was honored as Missouri Valley Football Conference Coach of the Year and was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year honor.

"As Georgia State Football enters its next chapter with the move to FBS and the Sun Belt Conference, we need a program-builder, and that's exactly what we have in Trent Miles," Levick said. "He is a dynamic leader, a tireless recruiter, and a talented coach who will take this program to the next level.

"Through Trent's leadership and hard work, he turned the Indiana State football program into a winner, and he will do the same for Georgia State," Levick continued. "He presented an impressive and detailed plan during his interview which addressed how he would build a winning GSU football program, and we look forward to helping him implement that plan. We are delighted to welcome Trent, his wife Bridget and their children to the Georgia

State family."

It took just three years for Miles to produce a winning season as he led his 2010 Sycamores to a 6-5 mark for the school's first winning campaign since 1996.

An Indiana State graduate, Miles guided his alma mater to another winning season in 2011 and then a 7-4 record in 2012, including a 5-3 mark in the MVFC. No Sycamore team has won more games since the 1984 squad on which Miles played, and the school's current run of three straight winning seasons is the longest in Terre Haute since ISU had six straight from 1964-69.

Following the 2012 season, Miles was honored as the AFCA Region Four Coach of the Year, earning that distinction for the second time in three seasons.

Under Miles' direction, ISU rose as high as No. 14 in the national polls and up to No. 5 in the GridIron Power Index in 2012. The No. 14 national ranking in The Sports Network Top 25 was the Sycamores' highest since joining the

MVFC in 1987 as well as the highest in the Trent Miles era.

The highlight of the 2012 season was the Sycamores' 17-14 road victory at No. 1-ranked North Dakota State, the defending FCS champion.

"I am extremely honored and excited to be the new head football coach at Georgia State University," Miles said. "We are committed to building this program into one that competes for championships on the field and in the classroom. We will strive to represent our student body, alumni and the state of Georgia with character and integrity.

"We look forward to building upon what Coach Bill Curry has started," Miles continued. "He is truly a legend in this profession, and his efforts are greatly appreciated. We are ready and focused to begin the process of taking Panther Football to the next level."

The last two seasons, Miles' program featured one of the top players in the FCS ranks in running back Shakir Bell. A first-team All-American as a sophomore in 2011, Bell led the nation in rushing with 151.8 yards per game and tied for second

in voting for the Walter Payton Award as the top player in the FCS. Bell was one of two first-team All-Americans who Miles coached in 2011 as defensive end Ben Obaseki was also named to the Associated Press first team. They were the first two AP first-team All-Americans in school history.

In 2012, Bell ranked sixth nationally in rushing (134.1 ypg) and again earned All-America accolades from AP (third team) and The Sports Network (second team). Cornerback Johnny Towalid was also recognized as an All-American by AP (second team) and The Sports Network (third team).

Indiana State led the MVFC in the number of all-conference selections in both 2011 (13) and 2012 (14).

Miles achieved success in 2010 with a prolific offense that ranked in the top 15 nationally in scoring with 31.2 yards per game, while his 2012 squad was built on a defense that finished third in the nation in points allowed (14.3 pg) and fifth in total defense (296.4 ypg).

Among the many notable accomplishments by Indiana State

under Miles the last three seasons is the Sycamores' 44-16 victory over Western Kentucky in 2011, the program's first win over an FBS opponent since 2001. That 2011 Sycamore squad spent eight weeks in the national FCS polls, climbing to No. 16 in the nation.

Throughout his career, Miles has coached on both sides of the ball and possesses more than 20 years of college coaching experience as well as one year as a National Football League assistant with the Green Bay Packers. As an offensive assistant for the Packers in 2000, Miles worked with wide receivers and quality control. He coached NFL All-Pro receiver Antonio Freeman.

In the seven years following at Stanford (wide receivers, 2001), Notre Dame (wide receivers, 2002-04) and Washington (running backs, 2005-07), Miles also coached and developed many talented skill players. Among his pupils were Stanford's Teyo Johnson, a second-round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2003, Notre Dame's Maurice Stovall and Arnaz Battle, both of whom went on to the NFL, Jeff Samardzija, an All-

Miles was named AFCA Region Coach of the Year in two of the last three seasons and was a finalist for several national coaching honors in 2010.

America wide receiver at Notre Dame who is now playing professional baseball for the Chicago Cubs, and Louis Rankin, a 1,000-yard rusher at Washington.

Miles began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Indiana State (1987), New Mexico (1988-89) and Oklahoma (1990). While at New Mexico, one of his mentors was Marvin Lewis, now the head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Miles moved to an assistant coaching position at Northern Illinois for four seasons, working with receivers (1991-93) and then defensive backs (1994). Miles then headed west for a two-year stint at Hawai'i, where he coached wide receivers (1995) and defensive backs (1996).

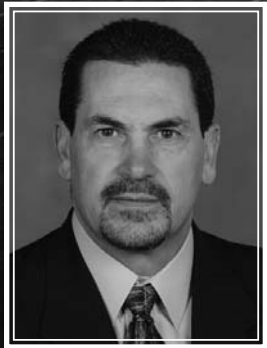
As wide receivers coach at Fresno State from 1997-99, Miles helped the Bulldogs to a share of the 1999 Mountain

West Conference title and a berth in the Las Vegas Bowl. He also recruited and coached future NFL standout Bernard Berrian.

Miles, 49, is a native of Terre Haute, Ind., and a 1987 graduate of Indiana State with a degree in criminology. He was a wide receiver for the Sycamores from 1982-86, playing on the 1983 and 1984 squads that each won nine games and advanced to the FCS playoffs. The 1984 Sycamores were ranked No. 1 in the nation for much of the season, and that team was inducted into the Indiana State University Hall of Fame in 2002.

He is married to the former Bridget Hogan, and the couple has three daughters, Kaylee, Anna, and Charlie Elizabeth, and one son, Noah Michael.

HAROLD ETHERIDGE

Assistant Head Coach / Offensive Line

First Year at GSU



Harold Etheridge, a veteran coach with more than two decades of experience, joined Trent Miles' coaching staff at Georgia State in 2013 as the offensive line coach and assistant head coach.

Etheridge was Miles' offensive coordinator the last two years at Indiana State and his offensive line coach the last three seasons, helping the Sycamores post three consecutive winning seasons for the first time since the 1960s.

"Harold Etheridge is a veteran and an excellent offensive line coach," Miles said. "He stresses fundamentals and technique, and he brings toughness to the offensive line. He makes it fun for his players, but he will get the most out of them. And he is a really good recruiter."

In two seasons as offensive coordinator, Etheridge produced one of the nation's top rushers in running back Shakir Bell. A first-team All-American as a sophomore in 2011, Bell led the nation in rushing with 151.8 yards per game and tied for second in voting for the Walter Payton Award as the top player in the FCS. In 2012, Bell ranked sixth nationally in rushing (134.1 ypg) while earning second-team All-America honors.

Between the 2010 and 2012 seasons, Indiana State had 17 offensive players earn all-conference recognition, including five offensive linemen.

Etheridge joined Miles' ISU staff in 2010 and made an immediate impact in the program's remarkable turnaround. The offensive line blocked for a unit that ranked 14th in the nation in scoring with 31.2 points per game for a school-record 351 points and 17th in total offense at 411.8 yards per game, helping the

Sycamores post a 6-5 record for their first winning season since 1996.

Before going to ISU, Etheridge spent the previous two years coaching the offensive line at Washington State (2008-09) and one year in the same role at Northern Illinois (2007).

During a three-year stint as the offensive line coach at North Texas (2004-06), Etheridge produced an offensive line that blocked for the nation's leading rusher in 2004 in Jamario Thomas, who ran for 180.1 yards per game. The Mean Green won the Sun Belt Conference title and earned a berth in the New Orleans Bowl.

Etheridge began his coaching career in the high school ranks, first at Gallup (N.M.) High School (1983-86) and then Ballard (Ky.) High School (1987-88).

From there, he moved to a collegiate position at Kentucky, serving as a graduate assistant working with offensive tackles in 1989-90. He worked under

GSU's first head coach Bill Curry in his second season at UK.

Etheridge then spent the next nine seasons as the offensive line coach at Illinois State, helping the Redbirds earn a spot in the NCAA FCS playoffs in 1998 before winning the Gateway Conference title and reaching the FCS semifinal game in 1999.

In 2000, he moved with head coach Todd Berry to Army and coached the Black Knights' offensive line for four seasons.

A native of Gallup, N.M., Etheridge was a four-year starting offensive guard for Western New Mexico (1979-82). He earned a bachelor's degree in marketing and management from the school in 1982.

Etheridge, who in 2001 published a book entitled "Coaching the Front Liners," and his wife, Jeanne, are the parents of twins, Clayton and Eliza.

JEFF JAGODZINSKI

Offensive Coordinator

First Year at GSU



Jeff Jagodzinski, a long-time National Football League assistant coach and a successful collegiate head coach, is the offensive coordinator on Trent Miles' first Georgia State staff.

Jagodzinski previously worked with Miles on the Green Bay Packers' staff in 2000, and he is well-acquainted with the city of Atlanta, having served as the Atlanta Falcons' tight ends coach in 2004 and then offensive line coach in 2005. He is also familiar to Atlanta fans as the college head coach of Falcons' quarterback Matt Ryan.

"What an opportunity to be able to hire someone with the experience and knowledge that Jeff Jagodzinski brings," Miles said. "He's a great offensive mind, and he's been a successful head coach at the highest level of college football. He will teach concepts and skills that will only make our offense better. How appealing it is for young men to know they can be coached by the man who coached Matt Ryan."

Jagodzinski enjoyed two highly successful seasons as the head coach at Boston College, posting a 20-8 record and capturing back-to-back Atlantic Coast Conference Atlantic Division crowns. In 2007, with Ryan at quarterback, Jagodzinski led the Eagles to an 11-3 record—BC's highest win total since 1940—a berth in the ACC Championship game and a bowl-game victory over Michigan State.

In addition to the exploits of ACC Player of the Year Ryan on offense, Jagodzinski's first BC squad also featured a strong defense that was No. 2 in the nation against the run. Safety Jamie Silva was a first-team All-America selection.

Even after Ryan became the No. 2 pick in the 2008 NFL draft following, Jagodzinski kept BC winning in 2008 with a 9-5 record and another trip to the ACC title game.

Along with Ryan, Jagodzinski coached three other future first-round draft picks at Boston College in nose tackle B.J. Raji (2009,

Green Bay) and offensive linemen Gosder Cherilus (2008, Detroit) and Anthony Castonzo (2011, Indianapolis).

Jagodzinski began his coaching career in 1985 as the running backs coach at his alma mater, Wisconsin-Whitewater. In 1986, he served as the offensive line coach at Northern Illinois before spending two years (1987-88) as a graduate assistant at LSU.

In 1989, Jagodzinski began an eight-year stint as the offensive line coach at East Carolina (1989-96), highlighted by the 1991 season, when the Pirates posted an 11-1 record.

He then spent two seasons as the offensive coordinator at Boston College (1997-98) on Tom O'Brien's staff. At BC,



Jagodzinski's offenses averaged more than 400 yards per game in each of his two seasons, featuring future Pro Bowl quarterback Matt Hasselbeck in 1997 and All-American running back Mike Cloud in 1998, who ranked third in the nation in rushing.

Jagodzinski began his NFL career in 1999, joining the Green Bay Packers as tight ends coach from 1999-2003. It was there that he worked with Miles in 2000.

He then moved to the Atlanta Falcons, where he served as tight ends coach in 2004, helping Atlanta reach the NFC Championship game, and then offensive line coach in 2005. During that time, the Falcons featured one of the NFL's most successful rushing offenses, leading the league in both rushing yards per game and rushing yards per carry those two years. In 2005, Jagodzinski's line blocked for Pro Bowl running back Warrick Dunn, who gained over 1,400 yards.

Jagodzinski returned to the Packers as offensive coordinator for one season (2006) before taking over as head coach at Boston College. Under his direction, Green Bay ranked among the top 10 in the NFL in total offense.

In college and the NFL, Jagodzinski has been part of offensive staffs that worked with future Pro Bowl quarterbacks Brett Favre, Michael Vick, Aaron Rogers and Matt Ryan.

He served as the head coach of the Omaha Nighthawks of the UFL in 2010, and in 2012, he worked as a volunteer assistant coach at Ave Maria University in Florida.

Jagodzinski was a three-year starter and four-year player (1981-84) at fullback at Wisconsin-Whitewater. He earned a B.S. degree in education at UW-Whitewater in 1985.

Jagodzinski and his wife, Lisa, have five children: Josh, JoAnne, Jessica, Jacqueline and Jennifer.

Defensive Coordinator

First Year at GSU



Jesse Minter, the defensive coordinator at Indiana State the last two years, followed Georgia State head coach Trent Miles to be the Panthers' defensive coordinator.

In 2012, Minter constructed a defensive unit that ranked third in the FCS in scoring defense, allowing just 14.3 points per game, and sixth nationally in total defense at 296.4 yards per game. The Sycamores also ranked fifth nationally in pass efficiency defense, 14th in passing yards allowed and 28th in rushing yards allowed.

One of the highlights of the 2012 season was Indiana State's 17-14 road victory at No. 1-ranked and defending FCS champion North Dakota State. In that game, cornerback Johnny Towalid scored 14 points for ISU by returning a pair of interceptions for touchdowns.

Over the last two years, 13 Indiana State defensive standouts have earned All-Missouri Valley Football Conference honors.

Minter originally joined Miles' defensive staff at Indiana State in 2009 before being elevated to the coordinator position for the 2011 season. He was a key component in the Sycamores' remarkable turnaround under Miles that saw ISU post a winning season in 2010 for the first time since 1996. The program added winning campaigns in 2011 and 2012 to give ISU three consecutive winning seasons for the first time since the 1960s.

Minter went to Indiana State following two years as a graduate assistant at Cincinnati, where he served

on Brian Kelly's staff, working with the defensive staff and assisting in coaching the linebackers. The Bearcats won the Big East Conference title in 2008 and earned a BCS berth in the Orange Bowl. The Cincinnati defense led the nation in takeaways in 2007.

Minter spent the 2006 season as a football intern at Notre Dame, when the Irish posted a 10-3 record.

He played college football at the College of Mount St. Joseph (Ohio), which compiled a school-record 30-10 mark during his four years, including back-to-back conference titles and Division III playoff appearances

A native of Yorktown, Ind., Minter is married to the former Rachelle Wittich. His father is former Cincinnati head football coach Rick Minter.

Wide Receivers

First Year at GSU



Former National Football League wide receiver Keary Colbert serves as Georgia State's wide receivers coach after joining head coach Trent Miles' first GSU staff in March 2013.

Colbert spent a total of six years in the NFL, four of them with the Carolina Panthers, who selected him in the second round of the 2004 NFL Draft. In 2004, he set Carolina rookie records for receptions (47), receiving yards (754) and receiving touchdowns (5) in a season. The following year, he helped the Panthers reach the 2005 NFC Championship game.

"Keary Colbert is an excellent addition to our staff," Miles said. "He is extremely knowledgeable as someone who played the wide receiver position at the highest level, both in college and then in the NFL.

"He will be unbelievable in teaching these young men the fundamentals and techniques of the receiver position," continued Miles. "He has the ability to motivate a young man to perform, and with his ability to relate to players, I think he will be an outstanding recruiter."

Colbert played for three NFL teams in 2008 – the Denver Broncos, Seattle Seahawks and Detroit Lions. He was with the Florida Tuskers of the United Football League in 2009 and then returned to the NFL with the Kansas City Chiefs in 2011.

Colbert began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Southern California, in 2010, working with the tight ends. Following that season, USC tight end Jordan Cameron was selected in the fourth round of the 2011 NFL Draft.



A California native, Colbert was a prep All-American at Hueneme High School in Oxnard. He went on to a standout career at USC, where he finished as the Trojans' all-time leader in receptions (207) while gaining 2,964 receiving yards and catching 19 touchdown passes in his career. He was a key member of the Trojans' 2003 Associated Press national

championship team, catching 69 passes for 1,013 yards with nine touchdowns. As a senior, he was a team captain, won USC's Most Inspirational Award, earned All-Pac-10 honors and was selected to play in the Senior Bowl.

Colbert earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from USC in 2006. He has one son, Kaden.

First Year at GSU



Luke Huard, formerly the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Illinois State, joined the Georgia State coaching staff for the 2013 season as the quarterbacks coach under head coach Trent Miles.

Huard spent the last four seasons at Illinois State, including one year (2009) as quarterbacks coach before he was elevated to offensive coordinator for the last three seasons (2010-12).

In 2012, Huard's unit led the Missouri Valley Football Conference in passing and total offense as the Redbirds averaged better than 30 points a game while compiling a 9-4 record and advancing to the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs.

In his four years at ISU, Huard developed quarterback Matt Brown, who was the MVFC Newcomer of the Year in 2009, a three-time all-conference honoree and the MVFC Offensive Player of the Year in 2012.

He previously worked with Miles at Washington, where Huard served as a graduate assistant in 2007-08.

While at Washington, Huard worked with the Huskies' quarterbacks, including current Tennessee Titans' signal caller Jake Locker, who was the Pac-10 Newcomer of the Year in 2007.

Huard began his coaching career as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Tacoma's Washington High School following graduation from North Carolina in 2002. He then spent four seasons as the head coach at Interlake High School (Wash.), where he led the program to its first winning season in 10 years in 2004.

In 2004, he also served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the Eastside Hawks, a semi-professional football team that went 10-0 and won the Northwest Football League title.

Huard was a three-year member of the North Carolina football team. As a quarterback, he played in seven games for the Tar Heels, including four starts, as a freshman in 1999.

As a high school quarterback at Puyallup (Wash.) High School, Huard was Washington's Gatorade Player of the Year

and an honorable mention All-America selection as a senior.

Huard comes from a football family. Both of his older brothers, Brock and Damon, were standout quarterbacks at Washington and went on to play professionally in the NFL. Huard's father, Mike, coached all three sons at Puyallup High School, where he also coached future NFL quarterback Billy Joe Hobert.

Huard is married to the former Dolly Tan.

SHANNON JACKSON

Defensive Line

First Year at GSU



Shannon Jackson joined the Georgia State football staff of head coach Trent Miles as defensive line coach, the same position he held on Miles' staff at Indiana State the last five years.

In 2012, Jackson, who also served as assistant head coach at ISU, helped coach a defense that ranked third in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 14.3 points per game, and sixth nationally in total defense at 296.4 yards per game. The Sycamores were fifth nationally in pass efficiency defense, 14th in passing yards allowed and 28th in rushing yards allowed.

The highlight of the 2012 season was Indiana State's 17-14 road victory at No. 1-ranked and defending FCS champion North Dakota State. In that game, the ISU defense scored 14 points.

In 2011, ISU defensive end Ben Obaseki earned first-team All-America honors by the Associated Press as he and teammate Shakir Bell, a running back, became the first Sycamores to earn this honor.

Jackson spent a total of 10 seasons at Indiana State, originally coaching on the Sycamores' staff from 2000-04 before returning to his alma mater in 2008 when Miles took over.

He was a key component in the Sycamores' remarkable turnaround under Miles that saw ISU post a winning season in 2010 for the first time since 1996. The program added winning campaigns in 2011 and 2012 to give ISU three consecutive winning seasons for the first time since the 1960s.

Before returning to Indiana State, Jackson spent three years coaching the defensive line at Eastern Illinois (2005-07). In 2006, he helped coach a defensive unit that led the nation with 36 turnovers forced.

In the summer of 2003, Jackson worked with the Jacksonville Jaguars' staff through the NFL's Minority Internship Program.

After a standout playing career at Indiana State, Jackson began his coaching career in 2000 as a graduate assistant on the ISU staff, working with tight ends. He moved to a full-time position as a defensive assistant from 2001-03.

In that first stint at ISU, he tutored Kyle Mitchell, who went on to break the school sack record that Jackson himself had set during his playing days. Jackson also coached Richard Harris, who signed a free agent contract with the Tennessee Titans.

Jackson was a standout defensive lineman for the Sycamores, earning All-America recognition as a senior in 1999.

A native of Fort Wayne, Ind., Jackson earned a bachelor's degree from Indiana State in criminology in 2000. He and his wife, Sumalayo, have a son, Bryson, and a daughter, Brylee.

Running Backs

First Year at GSU



Tony Tiller, a former professional football player in the National Football League and Canadian Football League, is in his first year at Georgia State as running backs coach. Tiller was the final coaching hire for head coach Trent Miles in his first season in Atlanta.

Tiller spent the 2012 season as an assistant coach at Reinhardt University in

Waleska, Ga., a startup program that will begin play at the NAIA level in 2013.

“Tony is a young coach with an extremely bright future,” Miles said. “He has a lot of energy, he relates well with young men, and he will do an outstanding job in recruiting, which is always our focus. He brings a great knowledge of the game as someone who has played at a high level.”

After completing an all-conference career at East Tennessee State, Tiller spent time on the roster of the Kansas City Chiefs in 2004-05 before moving to the CFL, where he played defensive back for the B.C. Lions, Calgary Stampeders and Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

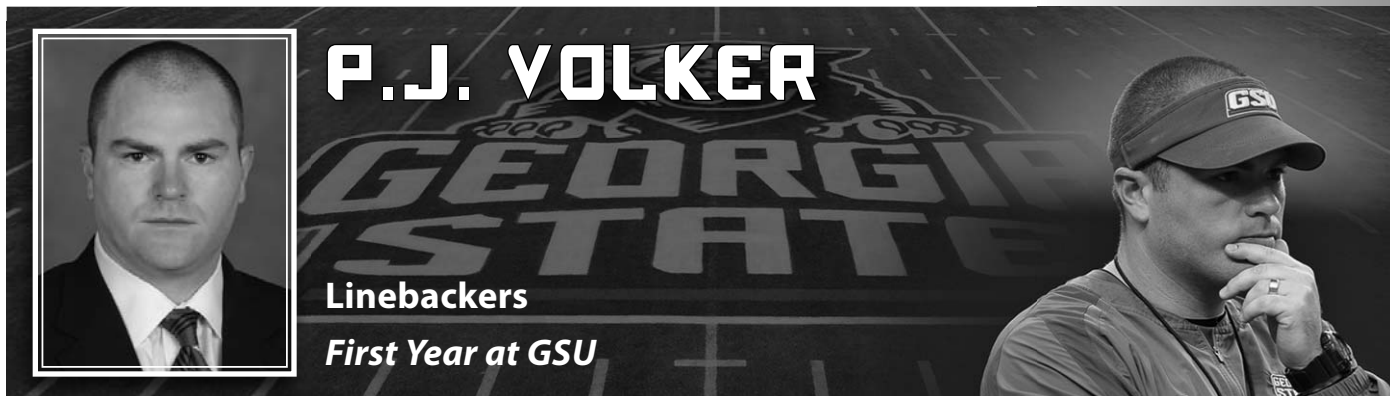
Tiller then played with the Atlanta Falcons in the 2009 preseason. He also spent time in the United Football League.

First Year at GSU

P.J. Volker joined head coach Trent Miles' Georgia State football staff as linebackers coach after serving in the same capacity under Miles at Indiana State.

Volker spent the last three years with Miles as linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator for the Sycamores, helping ISU post three straight winning seasons.

In 2012, he helped coach a defensive unit that ranked third in the FCS in scoring defense, allowing just 14.3 points per game, and sixth nationally in total defense at 296.4 yards per game. One of the highlights for ISU's defense in 2012 was an outstanding performance in the Sycamores' stunning 17-14 upset at No. 1-ranked North Dakota State, in which the defense accounted for 14 points.

Over his three seasons, seven Indiana State linebackers were named to the all-conference team, including three-time selection Aaron Archie, who made over 100 tackles each of the last two years.

Volker originally joined Miles' defensive staff at Indiana State in 2010 and took part in bringing about the program's dramatic turnaround. In his first year, the Sycamores posted a breakout season with a 6-5 record in 2010, their first winning season since 1996.

Volker went to ISU in 2010 from Thomas More College, a Division III program in Kentucky where he coached the linebackers and served as the program's recruiting coordinator. He began his coaching career as the running

backs coach at Thiel College.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Volker was a three-year letterwinner and two-time all-conference selection at the College of Mount St. Joseph (Ohio). He is married to the former Amanda Naseef.

Defensive Backs / Special Teams

First Year at GSU



J.D. Williams, who brings 16 years of college coaching experience and a successful career in the National Football League, joined the Georgia State football staff of head coach Trent Miles as secondary coach and special teams coordinator.

Williams, a former first-round NFL draft pick who was a member of four Super Bowl teams with the Buffalo Bills, comes to Georgia State after three seasons on the defensive staff at UNLV. He also has seven years of experience in the Pac-10 (now the Pac-12) and previously worked with Miles at both Washington and Fresno State.

"J.D. Williams brings experience from playing at the NFL level and coaching at the highest level of college football," Miles said. "He's been at some of the best programs in the nation, he has coordinated a defense, and he is an excellent recruiter."

At UNLV, Williams served two seasons (2010-11) as the Runnin' Rebels' assistant head coach, secondary coach and pass defense coordinator before he was elevated to defensive coordinator in 2012, when he continued to coach the defensive backs.

Williams went to UNLV after spending the 2009 season as the cornerbacks coach at Utah. The Utes posted a 10-3 record, including a victory over Washington in the Poinsettia Bowl, and ranked 16th in the nation in passing yards and ninth in pass efficiency defense.

That followed three seasons at Washington (2006-08) and four seasons at California (2002-05). At Washington, he worked on the same staff with Miles his first two years. During his tenure at California, Williams helped the Golden

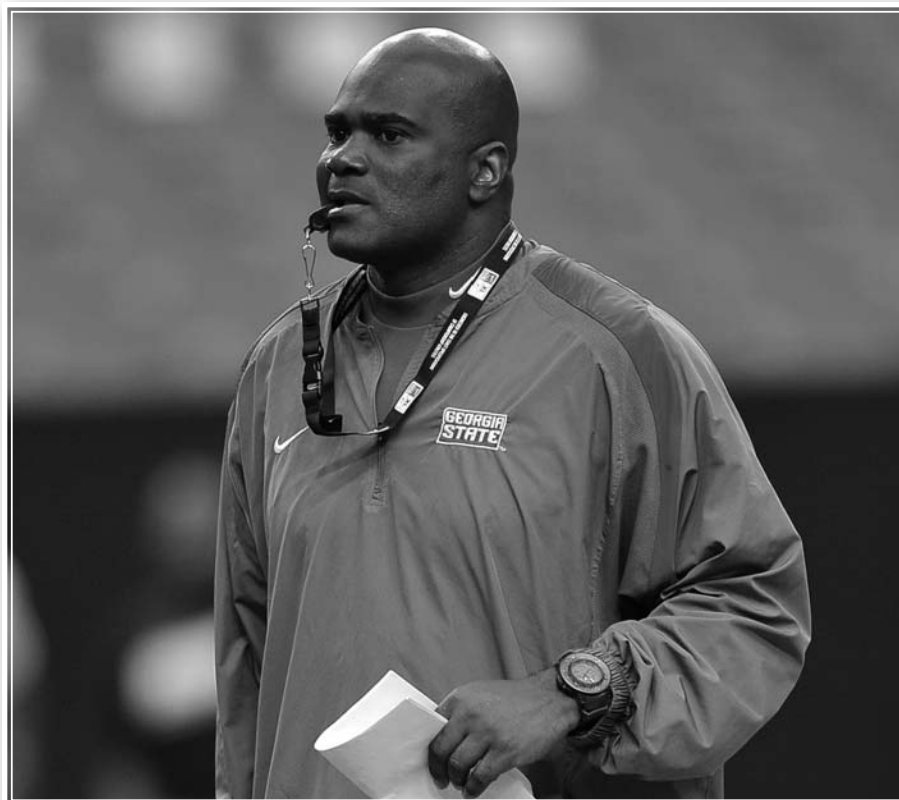
Bears to a 33-17 overall record and three bowl game appearances.

Williams moved into coaching in 1997 after his NFL playing career, beginning as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Fresno State, where Miles was on the coaching staff. He then coached the secondary at San Jose State in 1998 and Cal Poly in 1999 before returning to Fresno State as secondary coach for two years (2000-01). He helped the Bulldogs to an 18-7 record and a pair of bowl berths.

After a standout playing career at Fresno State, Williams was a first-round

NFL Draft pick in 1990, going to the Buffalo Bills with the 16th selection. He went on to play on the Bills' four Super Bowl teams from 1990-93, including Super Bowl XXVIII at the Georgia Dome. He also played for the Arizona Cardinals and San Francisco 49ers before his six-year pro career ended after the 1996 season.

Williams, from Coalinga, Calif., earned his bachelor's degree in criminology from Fresno State in 1997. He and his wife, Jamie, have four children: Nicole, Kyra, Zoe and David.

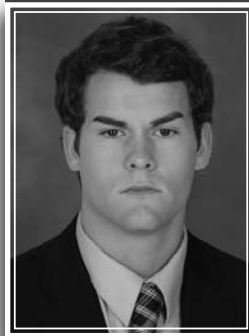
Nicholas Vogt enters his first season with the Georgia State program as the equipment manager. He joined the GSU staff in 2013 after five years at Indiana.

S.C. STATE 33, GEORGIA STATE 6

Game 1: Aug. 30, 2012 • 7:30 p.m. (CSS)
Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga.

Richard Cue was just too much for Georgia State in the 2012 season opener. The South Carolina State quarterback threw for 300 yards and three touchdowns as the Bulldogs defeated the Panthers 33-6 in front of 18,921 at the Georgia Dome.

Georgia State scored on its first possession of the second half, getting a 25-yard field goal from Matt Ehasz to get to within 14-6, but the hosts never got closer.

On the ensuing drive, Cue, who a year ago threw for just 900 yards in nine games, completed all three of his pass attempts, including a 13-yard touchdown toss to Tyler McDonald that put the Bulldogs up 21-6.

In between two Georgia State drives—one that ended on a punt and the other when Ehasz's 36-yard field goal attempt was wide right—Nick Belcher kicked a pair of field goals from 20 and 27 yards, the last of which capped a 17-play drive and made it 27-6 with just under six minutes to play.

"Obviously a huge disappointment," Georgia State coach Bill Curry said. "We have a good football team and we'll continue to work very hard. We will not concede anything. (South Carolina State) played well, did a lot of things well, better than we did. We'll learn from it, go back to work and we'll be a good football team this year."

A late touchdown pass helped South Carolina State build a 14-3 halftime lead. With 40 seconds left in the second quarter, Cue led the visiting Bulldogs on a two-play drive, culminating in a 22-yard touchdown toss to McDonald. The junior wide receiver made a great catch, then tight-roped the sideline and reached the end zone.

Georgia State, kicking off its third season and final one under coach Bill Curry, had cut the deficit to 7-3 on a 36-yard field goal by Matt Ehasz. But the Panthers couldn't capitalize after Cue was intercepted for the second time in the half, this time by Brent McClendon with 5:40 to play in the second. Ehasz's 24-yard attempt hit the right upright to keep it a four-point game.

"We had plenty of chances. We had a good chance coming out during the second half," said Curry. "When we get in the red zone, we have to score. And we just didn't do that."

South Carolina State struck first. On a third-and-seven deep in their own territory, the Bulldogs got a 73-yard touchdown connection from Cue to Lennel Elmore to make it 7-0 just 54 seconds into the game.

Georgia State had a pair of record-breaking plays in the opening half. Senior running back Donald Russell (120 yards on 12 carries) tied teammate Kelton Hill for the fourth-longest run from scrimmage in the Panthers' three-year history with a 52-yard scamper midway through the first quarter. That gave the Panthers the ball at the South Carolina State 32-yard line, but the drive stalled after three short runs and an incompleteness on fourth-and-two.

Punter Matt Hubbard bested his own school record with an 80-yard punt that pinned South Carolina State to its 2-yard line. Hubbard's previous best was a 64-yarder against Texas-San Antonio in October, 2011.



PUNTER MATT HUBBARD enjoyed a record-setting day against South Carolina State as he punted five times for a 62.2-yard average. His third punt of the night travelled a school-record 80 yards, and he also had boots of 58, 59, 55 and 59 yards. Hubbard was named National Special Teams Player of the Week by the Sports Network.

That set up the Panthers' defense, which came up with a big stop on third-and-2 to force a punt. Redshirt freshman Ben McLane, making his first collegiate start at quarterback, came through with his first big play, hooking up with Danny Williams for a 20-yard completion. It allowed Ehasz to boot his field goal with 6:33 left until halftime.

McLane struggled in his debut but was under heavy pressure the entire night. He completed just 7 of 15 passes for 54 yards and was sacked five times.

"We'd told him that this would be faster than anything he'd seen. But he will adjust in time," Curry said of McLane. "I'm not sure he really got a fair chance to show what he can do."

Hill relieved McLane on a number of possessions, and the redshirt-junior was 7 of 13 for 76 yards.

Late in the game, Georgia State was driving when Parris Lee fumbled, Dominique Mitchell recovered and returned it 68 yards for a touchdown and a 33-6 cushion.

Playing just its third game ever against a Football Bowl Subdivision opponent, Georgia State (0-2) fell 51-13 at Tennessee (2-0) at Neyland Stadium.

"We fought and scratched every step of the way," GSU head coach Bill Curry said. "Are we playing the error-free football we need to? No. But

we're playing with a lot of effort and we'll learn from this experience.

"We showed much more grit and determination this game than last week, and we'll show more next week and the next week," he added.

Tennessee's Tyler Bray completed 18 of 20 passes for 310 yards and four touchdowns, three of them to Justin Hunter, who finished with eight catches for 146 yards.

"Tennessee's execution in the passing game was superb," Curry said. "We were taught some painful lessons by a great receiving corps and a potentially great quarterback. He was really delivering the ball in rhythm."

Despite the final score, the Panthers had bright spots in all phases.

Quarterback Ben McLane, the redshirt freshman playing just his second college game before 87,821 fans, was 18-for-41 for 146 yards. He converted three fourth downs with runs, and he scored the Panthers' only touchdown on a 12-yard scramble.

"He did a lot of great things today, and he also did some truly freshman things," Curry said of McLane, who at times had trouble handling the shotgun snaps.

Albert Wilson caught eight passes for 74 yards, and Donald Russell added 68 yards on the ground on 15 carries.

On defense, the GSU defensive line came up with a pair of turnovers as Terrance Woodard recovered a fumble and Joe Lockley grabbed an interception on a tipped ball.

Punter Matt Hubbard was impressive again, averaging 44.8 yards on eight punts, and place-kicker Christian Benvenuto booted field goals of 32 and 30 yards.

Georgia State trailed just 7-3 after one quarter. After Tennessee took the opening kickoff and drove 78 yards on 13 plays, the Panthers answered with a long drive of their own, moving 60 yards on 14 plays for a field goal.

Facing third-and-25 on their own 25-yard line following a clipping penalty, McLane found Wilson for 24 yards to the 49. GSU then converted the fourth-and-1 as McLane rambled 7 yards up the middle on a quarterback keeper.

After Russell ran 26 yards before he was tripped up a the 3, the Panthers had to settle for a 32-yard field goal by Christian Benvenuto.

Tennessee began its next possession in great field position at the GSU 39 after a 61-yard kickoff return by Cordarelle Patterson, but after one first down, the Panther defense held on three straight plays and forced a 38-yard field goal attempt, which Michael Palardy missed.

The GSU defense forced a three-and-out on the Vols' next possession, but a 35-yard punt return put UT in business again at the GSU 40. This time, Bray needed just two plays, hitting Hunter for 21 yards and then tight end Mychal Rivera for the 19-yard touchdown for a 14-3 lead with 11 minutes left in the half.

But the Panthers cut the deficit to 14-6 late in the second quarter as Benvenuto booted his second field goal from 30 yards with 5:31 left in the half. The drive started after Woodard recovered a fumble at the UT 41.

McLane's fourth-quarter touchdown was a 12-yard run on fourth-and-7 to cap a 12-play, 80-yard drive.

The Panthers played much of the game without two of their top three receivers. Danny Williams did not play due to the lingering effects of an ankle injury he sustained last game. Jordan Giles left the game with a shoulder injury after catching two passes for 34 yards in the first quarter.

UTSA 38, GEORGIA STATE 14

Georgia State fell to UTSA 38-14 Saturday night at the Georgia Dome.

Albert Wilson had three 100-yard receiving games a year ago. The Georgia State wide receiver got his first in 2012 against UTSA as Wilson caught six passes for 150 yards and two touchdowns for the Panthers.

Georgia State remained winless at 0-3, while UTSA improved to 3-0.

Wilson, a junior, helped the Panthers take their only lead of the game early in the opening quarter. Ben McLane hooked up with Wilson for an 84-yard touchdown on Georgia State's third play from scrimmage. The play accounted for the longest play from scrimmage in school history, surpassing Wilson's 78-yard touchdown catch from Kelton Hill against South Alabama in 2011.

UTSA answered with consecutive scoring drives to take a 10-point lead late in the opening quarter. Four plays after an 84-yard kickoff return by Kenny Harrison, UTSA got a 5-yard touchdown run from Evans Okotcha to go up 10-7. Roadrunners quarterback Eric Soza then completed four of five pass attempts, including a 5-yard touchdown toss to Aaron Grubb in the corner of the end zone to make it a 17-7 game.

Soza was 17-of-24 for 206 yards, and 10 different receivers caught passes.

"Great throws gave the guys some opportunities, but the receivers took advantage of those opportunities," UTSA coach Larry Coker said. "Your quarterbacks make your receivers look good and your receivers make your quarterbacks look good."

After a 13-play Panthers' drive ended with a blocked field goal attempt, UTSA got four plays of at least 14 yards during a 10-play drive and Okotcha dove in from a yard out to push the lead out to 24-7 with 5:31 left until halftime.

"You got to give a lot of credit to Texas San Antonio, they made a lot of plays," Georgia State coach Bill Curry said. "But our players fight hard, we fight hard to the final whistle."

The Panthers, playing their second home game of the season, were shorthanded in several areas as starters sat out with injuries. Defensive tackle David Huey, cornerback Demarius Matthews and wide receiver Jordan Giles all missed the game due to injury, and starting wide receiver Danny Williams was limited by an ankle injury.

The injury problems continued during the game. McLane, making his third collegiate start, left in the second quarter with an injury to his left wrist. McLane returned to guide the Panthers on their final possession of the half, then had an ice pack on his arm and sat out the entire second half.

"Well he...his left hand is numb. He's a tough guy so he didn't tell us that," Curry said. "He got hit on the forearm, that was why we took him out the first time."

After GSU turned the ball over on each of its first two possessions, backup quarterback Ronnie Bell provided a spark for the Panthers late in the third quarter. Bell had an 11-yard scramble on third-and-7, then connected with Wilson for a 9-yard completion on fourth-and-6. Bell found Wilson again, this time wide open streaking toward the end zone, for a 25-yard touchdown that cut the deficit to 38-14.

"We had to go with Ronnie [due to McLane's injury], and he did some great things," Curry said.

"I was ready to come off the bench and into the game and go out there to the best I can be," Bell said. "I think I showed we have a good backup quarterback, as well as a good starting quarterback, and that I can lead the team if the situation needed me to."

Georgia State's defense came up big on a pair of fourth-quarter possessions. UTSA drove from its own 18 to the Panthers' 2-yard line, but couldn't get

any further. The 19-play drive was stymied when Soza was tackled for a loss on fourth-and-goal. On UTSA's next drive, CheRod Simpson was stopped on a fourth down run from the 8-yard line.

"Both (the offense and defense) fought hard the whole game," Curry said. "As I've said repeatedly, we have a gutty bunch, but we're not doing what we have to do. We fight, scratch, bite and it's not enough. But we will continue. The players are responding, the players are giving effort."

UTSA looked poised to put the ball in the end zone on the game's opening possession. Aided by a 47-yard run by David Glasco II in which the tailback broke an initial tackle, the Roadrunners got to the State 5-yard line. But linebacker Jarrell Robinson made a great tackle in the backfield on third-and-two and UTSA settled for Sean Ianno's 26-yard field goal.

Georgia State fell to Colonial Athletic Association foe Richmond 35-14 at the Georgia Dome. Donald Russell rushed for 119 yards for the Panthers.

The Panthers fell to 0-4 overall playing in their first and last Colonial Athletic Association opener (the program moves to the Sun Belt Conference in 2013). Richmond improved to 3-1, 1-0 CAA.

"This process is very frustrating because we do so many things to hurt ourselves," GSU coach Bill Curry said. "If we simply play our very best all the time we should be a really good football team."

Russell, a senior, went over the 100-yard mark for the second time this season and fourth time in his GSU career. He added five receptions for 51 yards for a total of 170 all-purpose yards on 29 touches.

Russell matched his longest run at GSU with a 52-yard scamper late in the second quarter. That got the Panthers to the Richmond 28 and set up Georgia State's lone score. Russell later caught a 14-yard pass from Ben McLane and followed that with a 5-yard run on third-and-3. After an incomplection, McLane connected with Albert Wilson, who broke through one tackle and found the end zone to make it a 21-7 game.

The GSU defense forced a punt to give the Panthers the ball with 40 seconds left in the half. But McLane was intercepted by Cooper Taylor on a tipped ball, and that allowed the Spiders to once again make it a three-touchdown game. John Laub found Stephen Barnette for a 32-yard hook up to the GSU 8-yard line. Georgia State appeared to have prevented a touchdown with three consecutive goal-line stops, but after the stop on fourth-and-goal was erased on a defensive offside penalty, Laub pounded his way into the end zone for a 1-yard score on an untimed down to put the Spiders up 28-7.

"We had some work excellent goal line work but hurt ourselves again so there was all of that," Curry said. "We fought the daylights out of them... but after a valiant goal-line stand we gave them five downs."

Wilson, who entered the contest leading the CAA with 158.7 all-purpose yards per game, didn't get to add to that total in the first quarter. The junior suffered an apparent hip bruise but returned for Georgia State's first promising drive of the half, catching a 13-yard pass on the opening play from scrimmage. The Panthers got to the Richmond 13-yard line, but four straight incomplections, including one intended for Wilson and tipped out of the back of the end zone on fourth-and-10, turned the ball over on downs.

Richmond jumped on top with a pair of long drives in the opening half.

The Spiders picked up the game's first points, capping a 13-play, 83-yard drive with a touchdown midway through the opening quarter. Junior wide out Ben Edwards, who came into the day second in the CAA averaging 116.3 all-purpose yards per game, caught three passes for 26 yards, while Kendall Gaskins had three carries for 19 yards, including a 1-yard score that made it 7-0.

After a Georgia State punt, the visitors marched 71 yards in 14 plays, getting quarterback John Laub's 1-yard touchdown sneak to go up 14-0 with 13:35 left in the half.

Laub made it 21-0 when he found Stephen Barnette for a completion across the middle, and Barnette out-ran safety Demazio Skelton for a 49-yard touchdown.

Richmond grabbed a 35-7 cushion midway through the third when Laub capped an eight-play drive with a tumbling, 6-yard touchdown run.

Georgia State had a chance to cut into the lead late in the third, but Matt Ehasz was wide left on a 38-yard field goal attempt. The Panthers finally scored again with under a minute to play. Led by backup quarterback Ronnie Bell (91 passing yards, 31 rushing yards on the day), the Panthers drove 70 yards on eight plays, and Russell capped his big day

with a 2-yard touchdown run on a direct snap with 43 seconds left.

"It was a Donald Russell day," Curry said. "You just see how valuable he is, you just have to keep giving it to him when he's full speed. I'm really pleased with Ronnie Bell. I think Ronnie Bell made a statement about his ability."

Wilson wasn't the only one hobbling for the Panthers. Both starting center Michael Davis (ankle injury) and backup Ronald Martin (knees) left with injuries, forcing guard Tim Wynn to play center for much of the second half.

"There were some circumstances that were outside our control. We lost both our centers (and) Tim had to play center without having done it in two years," Curry said.

Georgia State fell at William & Mary 35-3 at Zable Stadium as the Panthers were undone by seven turnovers.

Donald Russell had 134 yards rushing and receiving and Ronnie Bell showed play-making

ability in his first start at quarterback for Georgia State, but William & Mary scored 28 points off GSU turnovers. The Panthers (0-5) hurt themselves with four interceptions and three lost fumbles.

"We work on ball security over and over and over, but if you turn the ball over that many times, you have no chance," GSU head coach Bill Curry said. "We have individuals who are showing good things, but our team has got to come together and do all the things that it takes to win."

Russell recorded his second straight 100-yard rushing effort and third this season with 107 yards on 21 carries, and he added four catches for 27 yards. Bell completed 13 of 26 passes for 157 yards and helped the Panthers convert eight of 14 third down plays, but the redshirt freshman had four interceptions and a lost fumble on a sack.

Keith McBride led the Tribe with 163 yards rushing and two touchdowns, while quarterback Raphael Ortiz also scored twice for the Tribe, who managed 312 yards rushing, including 204 in the second half as the GSU defense wore down.

Georgia State jumped in front first. After forcing William & Mary to punt on its first possession, the Panthers took over and moved 62 yards on 11 plays to set up a 37-yard field goal by freshman Wil Lutz, his first career three-pointer.

The Tribe looked to answer with a field goal attempt of their own, but the 45-yard attempt by Drake Kuhn was wide right. GSU forced the field goal attempt when Robert Ferguson chased W&M quarterback from the pocket and John Kelly tracked him down for the Panthers' first sack of the season.

The GSU defense came up with another big play early in the second quarter with a fourth-down stop of quarterback Raphael Ortiz at the Panther 44-yard line. But the Panthers gave the ball back two plays later on a rare fumble by Donald Russell at the William and Mary 44 yard. The Tribe turned that miscue into a scoring drive, capped by Keith McBride's 11-yard run that put William and Mary ahead, 7-3, with eight minutes remaining in the second quarter.

The Panthers then drove to the W&M 33 on their next possession before Bell was intercepted. GSU forced a punt and looked to take over with about 90 seconds left in the first half and trailing just 7-3. But Albert Wilson could not corral a bouncing punt, giving the Tribe possession at the GSU 11, and William and Mary punched it into the end zone on Ortiz's 1-yard run for a 14-3 halftime lead.

Still trailing just 14-3 after a William & Mary punt early in the third quarter, Bell drove the Panthers from their own 3-yard line all the way to the Tribe 36. On second down, he was sacked, leading to a fumble that the Tribe recovered at midfield and then converted into a touchdown four plays later.

The Panthers had another excellent scoring chance late the third quarter after driving from their own 19 to a first down at the Tribe 16. On first-and-10, backup center Ronald Martin, subbing for the injured Michael Davis, snapped the ball over Bell's head for a 25-yard loss. On third-and-35 at the 41, Bell's pass was intercepted in the end zone.

Despite putting up its best offensive performance of the season, the Georgia State football team dropped a 44-21 decision to Colonial Athletic Association foe No. 17/14 New Hampshire Saturday at the Georgia Dome.

GSU fell to 0-6 on the season, while New Hampshire, ranked No. 17 in the FCS Coaches Poll and No. 14 by the Sports Network, improved to 4-2 overall and 2-1 in the CAA with the win. UNH head coach Sean McDonnell earned his 100th career victory in his 14th season with the Wildcats.

Redshirt-freshman quarterback Ben McLane came off the bench and led the Panthers with 169 passing yards and two touchdown passes. Junior receiver Albert Wilson had 105 receiving yards, including touchdown catches of 54 and 47 yards.

UNH put up 624 total yards of offense on 83 plays as Wildcat quarterback Andy Vailas passed for 252 yards and four touchdowns in the win. Nico Steriti led all rushers with 126 yards and scored three touchdowns.

"We had a chance to drive up and down the field, but stopped ourselves repeatedly. When we did start to drive, it was too little too late," GSU head coach Bill Curry said. "Once again, the tendency, when the defense made a great play or had a turnover, we almost immediately found a way to turn the ball back over. That's just simply a matter of poise. There is no excuse and no explanation."

2012 GAME SUMMARIES

New Hampshire got on the board first on a 26-yard touchdown pass to Harold Spears that capped a four-play drive with 13:35 left in the first period. Mike MacArthur's kick attempt was good and gave UNH a 7-0 lead.

GSU tied the game on its first drive when starting quarterback Ronnie Bell connected with Wilson for a 54-yard touchdown pass that capped a six-play, 77-yard drive.

A GSU fumble at its own 28-yard line allowed the Wildcats to put together a 21-yard touchdown drive capped by an 8-yard pass from Vailas to Steriti for the score. A successful field goal attempt gave the Wildcats a 14-7 lead with 12:22 left in the second quarter.

The Wildcats struck again with 8:54 left in the first half when Steriti ran the ball seven yards for his second score of the period, giving UNH a 21-7 lead.

New Hampshire took advantage of a GSU turnover, scoring a touchdown with 14:34 left in the third period that extended the UNH lead to 28-7.

The Wildcats scored another touchdown with 3:14 left in the third quarter and followed with a 43-yard field goal by MacArthur to extend their lead to 38-7 with 40 seconds left in the third quarter.

McLane connected with Emmanuel Ogbuehi with 26-yard touchdown pass with 13:52 left in game that cut the UNH lead to 38-14.

The Wildcats added a final touchdown at the 13:32 mark in the fourth quarter, but the Panthers answered when McLane found Wilson in the end zone with a 47-yard TD pass that cut the UNH lead to 44-21 with 4:51 left to play in the game. That was the 13th career touchdown catch for Wilson, including seven of 45 yards of longer.

Donald Russell set Georgia State school records with 201 yards rushing and three touchdowns scored to lead the Panthers to a dominating 41-7 victory at Rhode Island, Georgia State's first win of the season.

Ben McLane passed for a career-best 213 yards and two touchdowns, Travis Evans scored twice and the Panthers did not commit a turnover or allow a sack. Meanwhile, the Georgia State (1-6) defense held Rhode Island (0-6) to 288 yards.

Russell, the senior from West Palm Beach, Fla., carried 21 times for 201 yards with two touchdown runs and also caught a 35-yard touchdown pass for a career-best 236 all-purpose yards. His previous rushing high was 146 yards last season versus South Alabama, and the previous school record was held by Kelton Hill with 152 yards versus West Alabama in 2011.

Walking off the field with the game ball in his hand, GSU head coach Bill Curry said, "Somebody handed this to me, but this ball is for our football team. This is so wonderful and so sweet, there are no words.

"We showed what we can do when we play together and don't turn the ball over."

Russell opened the scoring for GSU with a 35-yard touchdown catch from McLane. Russell caught a short wing pass in the flat and outraced the defense down the sideline for his first touchdown reception of his career.

Then Russell added to GSU's lead on the next possession as he broke through the middle for a 45-yard touchdown, his longest scoring run in a GSU uniform and the third-longest in Panther history.

"I'm just so happy to get this win. I wanted this for my team," Russell said. "Our line did a great job, our wide receivers did a great job blocking. Coach Bond made some great calls that me some looks, and my o-line took me to the promised land."

Travis Evans made the score 21-0 when he took a shovel pass from McLane and ran 36 yards for the score.

Wil Lutz tacked on a 40-yard field goal with 47 seconds left in the first half, the longest field goal of his career and the longest for the Panthers since last year's South Alabama game. That sent the Panthers into the locker room with a 24-0 advantage. Lutz added a 26-yard field goal on GSU's first possession of the third quarter.

Rhode Island had one scoring threat in the first half as the Rams drove deep into GSU territory, but on third-and-6 from the seven, linebacker Robert Ferguson intercepted Bentsen to end the drive. The interception was the second of Ferguson's career and was one of two turnovers forced by the Panthers. Mark Hogan, who played high school football nearby in Boston, made a game-high eight tackles and a fumble recovery, and another New England native, Theo Agnew, had five tackles and a sack.

Russell's third touchdown was classic Donald Russell. He carried four times for 45 yards on the 75-yard drive, breaking numerous tackles on each run, including his 6-yard scoring jaunt, which put the Panthers ahead 34-0, with six minutes left in the third quarter.

Evans concluded the scoring with a 2-yard touchdown run after taking direct snap on the second play of the fourth quarter. The junior running back also forced a fumble with a big hit on punt coverage.

Emmanuel Ogbuehi and Kelton Hill caught four passes each, and Albert Wilson added three catches for 71 yards.

VILLANOVA 49, GEORGIA STATE 24

Game 8: Oct. 20, 2012 • 3:30 p.m.
Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga.

No. 24 Villanova ran the ball 53 times for 343 yards in a 49-24 win over host Georgia State on Homecoming at the Georgia Dome.

The Wildcats, ranked No. 24 by the Sports Network, improved to 6-2 overall and 4-1 in Colonial Athletic Association move into a tie for first place in the conference standings. In addition to the rushing statistics, Villanova used a 66-yard punt return touchdown and a 32-yard interception return to open a 35-10 halftime lead.

Georgia State, coming off its first win of the year, fell to 1-7. The Panthers ran 70 plays to Villanova's 68 plays on the day and gained 309 total yards, sparked by junior Albert Wilson's six catches for 104 yards and five kickoff returns for 176 yards. His 61-yard kick return and 55-yard touchdown catch were GSU's two longest plays of the day.

Donald Russell, the reigning Colonial Athletic Association offensive player of the week who was coming off a school-record 201 rushing yards in the win over Rhode Island, was held to four yards on five carries before leaving the game in the first quarter with a knee injury. He did not return.

Playing in place of Russell was redshirt junior Travis Evans, who carried five times for 10 yards in the opening half. His last carry was a 9-yard touchdown scamper with 1:38 left in the second quarter to cut Villanova's lead to 35-10 at halftime.

Rosevelt Watson added 45 yards on eight carries.

"Donald had a knee strain and couldn't return. It will take time to see where he is," Curry said. "The other backs ran extremely well. They all ran well today and they all practice hard. One thing everyone preaches in this sport, if you've not a starter, practice as if you are going to start. All of them have practiced well and they played well."

Despite the lopsided score, the Panthers offense didn't quit and got a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns. GSU capped a 12-play drive when Ben McLane found Emmanuel Ogbuehi for a 3-yard score. With just over three minutes left in the game, backup quarterback Ronnie Bell found a wide-open Wilson who tight-roped the sideline for a 55-yard touchdown that made it a 49-24 game.

Wilson finished with six catches for 104 yards, along with 186 return yards for a school-record total of 290 all-purpose yards, breaking the record of 236 that Russell set a week earlier.

"Albert plays his heart out on every play, he's just a great player. It was too little, too late and that's too much of a repetitive story," Curry said. "We're just better than this and that's the part that is so painful."

Georgia State got on the scoreboard for the first time with 9:32 to play in the second quarter. Following Wilson's 61-yard kickoff return the Panthers' drive stalled at the 16-yard line, but Wil Lutz booted a 33-yard field goal to get GSU to within 21-3.

The Wildcats answered immediately with a pair of touchdowns. First, Villanova took just six plays to go 66 yards as Kevin Monangai's 12-yard touchdown run made it 28-3. On the first play of the ensuing drive, McLane was intercepted by Eric Loper who returned it 32 yards for a score.

Villanova marched down the field on its opening possession, traveling 86 yards in just seven plays to take the first lead of the day. The big play came when Kevin Monangai got deep into Georgia State territory on a 33-yard run. Three plays later, quarterback John Robertson scored from six yards to make it 7-0.

Midway through the first, Villanova punt returner Poppy Livers made a pair of Panthers miss, then found his way down the sideline for a 66-yard touchdown that put the visitors up 14-0. Livers' touchdown was the first Villanova punt return for a score since David Martin ran one back in 1980.

Villanova made it 21-0 early in the second when Robertson found Norman White in the back of the end zone for a 14-yard touchdown.

Robertson, a redshirt freshman who in an upset of Old Dominion ran for a school-record 189 yards, picked up 87 yards on the ground and 183 of total offense. Monangai rushed for 130 yards on 18 carries and Villanova picked up 470 yards of total offense.

"We were out of position on the quarterback runs," Curry said. "We have a response, we see it every week, it's not as if it's some kind of magic show. Probably didn't practice as well as we have, but the guys sucked it up and pulled it together. We thought by Thursday that we were in good shape in terms of concentration, but we didn't play that way."

Georgia State's late comeback fell just short as the Panthers fell at ninth-ranked James Madison 28-21 at Bridgeforth Stadium.

After falling behind 28-7, Georgia State scored a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns to pull within 28-21 and had one final possession with 56 seconds left but JMU (6-2, 4-1) held on for the victory.

Tight end Emmanuel Ogbuehi caught a 5-yard touchdown pass with 10:47 left and then set up another touchdown when he ran 54 yards on a fake punt. Travis Evans, playing for injured running back Donald Russell, rushed for a career-high 98 yards for the Panthers.

"That's a really painful loss against an outstanding football team because we had chances in all three phases—offense, defense and special teams—to win the game," GSU head coach Bill Curry said. "We needed to do a better job executing the little things to finish the job."

Georgia State trailed 14-7 after a strong first half in which the Panthers outgained JMU 171-122. The score remained that way until late in the third quarter when James Madison scored on a 13-yard run by Jordan Anderson to move ahead 21-7. That touchdown capped a five-play 68-yard drive that was aided by a personal foul penalty for contact above the neck on Drew Pearson, a tight end who also took snaps at defensive end for the first time because the Panthers have suffered so many injuries on the defensive line.

The Dukes added to their lead soon after as Brandon Lee blocked a punt and returned it 3 yards for a touchdown, putting the Dukes ahead, 28-7, with 14 minutes to play.

The Panthers responded by driving 81 yards on eight plays to pull within 28-14 with 6:31 left. Ogbuehi started the drive with a 17-yard run and then finished it when he caught a 5-yard pass from running back Roosevelt Watson, who had taken the snap in a Wildcat formation. That is the second career touchdown pass for Watson, who also threw one in 2010.

The GSU defense forced a three-and-out, and the Panthers took over at their own 33. On fourth-and-7 from the 36, Ogbuehi took the snap in punt formation and raced around the left side for 54 yards down to the 10-yard line. On the next play, McLane hit Parris Lee in the left flat, and Lee raced down the sideline for the score, bringing GSU within 28-21 with 6:31 left.

After the kickoff, JMU managed to grind the clock with runs, moving to the GSU 24-yard line when Cameron Starke missed his third field-goal attempt of the day to give the Panthers one final chance with 56 seconds left. After an 18-yard reception by Lynquez Blar and a roughing the

passer penalty, the Panthers had a final snap from the JMU 45-yard line with three seconds left, but the Dukes managed a sack to end the game.

JMU jumped in front early, taking advantage of a Georgia State turnover. Evans fumbled on the Panthers' first play from scrimmage to give the Dukes the ball at the 23-yard line. JMU needed just four plays to score as Birdsong hit Dae'Quan Scott for a 6-yard touchdown pass and a 7-0 lead.

The Panthers answered with an eight-play, 81-yard drive, all of it on the ground. After Watson rushed 10 yards for a first down at the JMU 47, Travis Evans raced 45 yards – the longest run of his career – before he was dragged down at the 2-yard line. Then Watson punched it in on the next play as GSU evened the score at 7-all with five minutes left in the first quarter.

After Wil Lutz hit the crossbar on a 53-yard field goal attempt, James Madison drove 63 yards on six plays, capped by a 4-yard scoring run by Starke. That put the Dukes ahead 14-7 early in the second quarter.

Ogbuehi, GSU's senior tight end, finished with a career-high six catches, along with his 71 yards rushing on two carries. Watson, another senior, contributed 30 yards rushing, one touchdown on the ground and one touchdown pass.

Quarterback Ben McLane completed 22 of 37 passes for 170 yards and one touchdown with no interceptions.

Georgia State outgained James Madison, ranked No. 9 by the Sports Network and No. 10 in the FCS Coaches Poll, 348 to 340.

D'Mario Gunn led the GSU defense with 10 tackles, one tackle for loss and an interception. Theo Agnew added nine tackles, a tackle for loss and three pass breakups.

Dae'Quan Scott led the Dukes with 130 yards rushing. Freshman quarterback Michael Birdsong passed for 119 yards and one touchdown in his first start.

Before the game, James Madison honored GSU head coach Bill Curry by making him an honorary letterman.

"On a personal note, I can't remember anybody doing anything nicer for me," said Curry. "To be made an honorary letterman at a proud institution like this is a tremendous honor, and I am extremely grateful."

OLD DOMINION 53, GEORGIA STATE 27

Taylor Heinicke passed for 351 yards and three touchdowns as No. 5 Old Dominion defeated Georgia State 53-27 at the Georgia Dome.

It was the final home game for head coach Bill Curry, the only coach in the program's history who will retire after the season. Before the game, Georgia State announced the locker room at the football team's practice facility will be named in Curry's honor.

"It absolutely stunned me," Curry said of the locker room naming. "It's the only time today [that he got emotional]. I had no intention in choking up. These amazing acts of kindness toward me today, I don't even have words."

The biggest highlights for Georgia State came from junior Albert Wilson, who set three school records. Wilson ignited the Georgia Dome crowd, changing direction and out-running the Old Dominion coverage team for a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown midway through the third quarter. It was a school record for Wilson, who also had a 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in 2010 against Alabama. On this one, Wilson fielded the ball four yards deep in the end zone.

"He was not supposed to bring that ball out," Curry said. "It's the longest kickoff return I've ever been a part of. Those are really fast people chasing him, and you just can't catch him."

With just over 10 minutes left in the game, Ben McLane made a perfect pass to Wilson, who was streaking down the sideline and turned it into a school-record 93-yard touchdown catch that made it a 46-21 game.

Wilson caught six passes for 149 yards and amassed a school-record 296 all-purpose yards.

Tight end Emmanuel Ogbuehi also topped 100 yards receiving with a career-best 108 yards on three catches, including a 55-yard reception from McLane and a 42-yard grab from wide receiver Danny Williams on a reverse.

Demazio Skelton intercepted two passes for GSU. D'Mario Gunn also had an interception, which he returned 73 yards, meaning this game produced the Panthers' longest kickoff return, interception return and play from scrimmage.

Heinicke, who came into the game leading FCS in total offense at 436 yards per game, was 28-of-42.

All 27 GSU points came in the second half. The Panthers marched 80 yards in six minutes, and senior Roosevelt Watson broke an initial tackle attempt and plunged into the end zone for a 3-yard touchdown that cut the deficit to 32-7.

The Panthers' best chances to score in the opening half came on a pair of second-quarter possessions. First, the Panthers got an 18-yard run by Travis Evans to help get to the ODU 31-yard line, but Wil Lutz's 48-yard field goal was short. Later, Ben McLane hooked up with Emmanuel Ogbuehi on a 55-yard completion to set up first-and-goal. Old Dominion's defense only allowed two more yards on the series before McLane was sacked on fourth down.

GSU had three first half turnovers, and they cost the Panthers on the scoreboard each time.

McLane fumbled midway through the first quarter and ODU, given excellent field position, took just four plays to travel 34 yards as Heinicke made it a 15-0 game with an 11-yard scoring strike to Tyree Lee.

Up 22-0, ODU safety Devon Simmons intercepted McLane and Heinicke found Larry Pinkard in the back of the end zone for a 4-yard touchdown to push the Monarchs' lead to 29-0. After Craig Wilkins picked off a tipped ball, Jarod Brown's 28-yard field goal sent ODU into the locker room up 32-0.

GSU scored its fourth touchdown of the second half when Malcolm Smith capped a nine-play drive by taking a direct snap for a 2-yard

ODU jumped on top with a nine-play scoring drive on the game's opening possession. Heinicke had a 34-yard run to get deep into GSU territory, and on third down, he threw a 9-yard touchdown toss to Marquel Thomas to put the Monarchs up 8-0.

Georgia State fell at Maine 51-7 in the final game of the 2012 season and the last contest for retiring head coach Bill Curry.

"I haven't really focused on the fact that this is the last hurrah; I'll think about later," Curry said after the game. "Right now, I'm just extremely disappointed that we couldn't end the season with our best effort."

Maine quarterback Marcus Wasilewski threw four touchdown passes, and Rickey Stevens rushed for 179 yards and one score to lead the Black Bears.

The injuries that decimated this Georgia State team all season were again a factor. The Panthers played without their top defensive player in noseguard Terrance Woodard, who was sorely missed on a defensive line that was already paper thin. Then GSU lost starting left tackle Ulrick John and tight end Emmanuel Ogbuehi early in the game, and the offense struggled.

Georgia State's lone score came on a 22-yard touchdown pass from Ben McLane to Danny Williams late in the first half.

McLane passed for 154 yards in the game, and Travis Evans rushed for 77 yards on 17 carries. Albert Wilson had three receptions for 75 yards.

Maine jumped to a 10-0 lead with scores on its first two possessions.

Wasilewski opened the game with a 46-yard run to the GSU 44, and then found Maurice McDonald for a 17-yard touchdown pass to give the Black Bears the early 7-0 lead. After Georgia State went three-and-out, Sean Decloux added a 41-yard field goal on the Bears next possession for a 10-0 advantage with six minutes left in the first quarter.

The Black Bears added to their lead in the second quarter with a pair of big plays in the passing game. First, Nigel Jones caught a screen pass from Wasilewski and raced 76 yards for a score. Georgia State then moved deep into Maine territory but had to settle for a 48-yard field goal attempt into the wind. After the missed field goal, Wasilewski found Damarr Aultman behind the

secondary for a 69-yard touchdown pass. That put Maine ahead 24-0 with 7:30 left in the first half.

The Black Bears and head coach Jack Cosgrove honored Curry before the game by presenting him with a pair of authentic boots from Maine retailer L.L. Bean.

"I deeply appreciate the personal gesture by Jack Cosgrove and the Maine program," Curry said.

In the locker room after his final game, Curry told his Panthers, "I want each of you to know that I love you, and I admire all the effort you have put in. We all know in this room that we are a better football team than we showed at any time this year. The next step is to become a great football team, and I know you will."

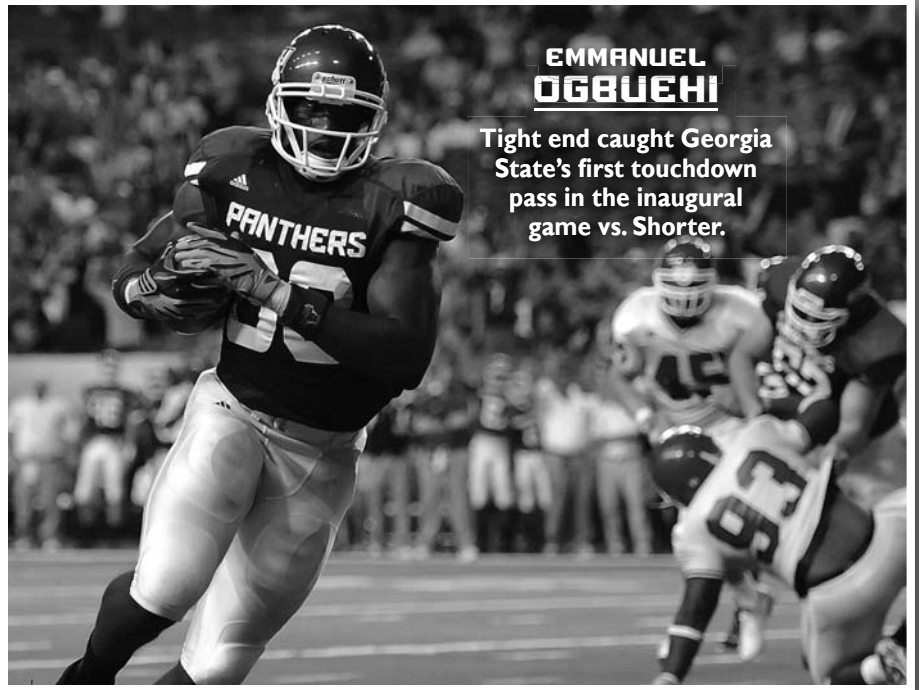
