CENTER PARC CREDIT UNION STADIUM is the home of Georgia State football. The Panthers took over this iconic property, formerly Centennial Olympic Stadium and then Turner Field and venue for Major League Baseball's Atlanta Braves, for the 2017 season.

The facility was renamed Center Park Credit Union Stadium as part of a 15-year, \$21 million agreement between Center Parc Credit Union, a division of Atlanta Postal Credit Union (APCU), and Georgia State Athletics, announced on Aug. 11, 2020.

Center Parc Stadium features 25,000 seats for football, a FieldTurf playing surface on "Pete" Petit Field and dramatic views of the Atlanta skyline. The conversion process incorporated the existing seating areas on the north, west and south sides of the stadium with a new grandstand constructed on the east side, formerly the outfield.

The Panthers enter their fourth season in this impressive venue, which also houses the Football Operations Suite, completed in 2019. All of the program's day-to-day operations are at Center Parc Stadium, including weight room, meetings rooms, coaches' offices, athletic training room and equipment room.



constructed as the 85,000-seat Centennial Olympic Stadium and used for the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games, including the Opening and Closing Ceremonies and the track and field competition. Ground was broken on the stadium on July 10, 1993.

Following the Olympic Games, much of the north end of the stadium was removed in the conversion to the 49,000-seat baseball park that served as the home of the Atlanta Braves from 1997 through 2016.

The first baseball game at Turner Field was played on April 4, 1997 as the Braves defeated the Chicago Cubs 5-4. The stadium hosted the National League Division Series a total of 11 times (1997–2005, 2010, 2013) and the NL Championship Series four times (1997–1999, 2001), as well as one World Series (1999), one NL Wild Card Game (2012, the first in baseball history), and the 2000 MLB All-Star Game.

The Braves played their final game at Turner Field, a 1-0 victory over the Detroit Tigers, on Oct. 2, 2016. In November 2016, the Board of Regents approved Georgia State University's purchase of 38 acres of the 68-acre site for \$22.8 million, and the conversion process began in early 2017.

Georgia State opened its new home against Tennessee State before 24,333 fans on Aug. 31, 2017.

THE PANTHERS' LOCKER ROOM at Georgia State Stadium

ROOM at Georgia State Stadium covers nearly 7,500 square feet. It is 55 yards long and 15 yards wide. It also features:

- * 115 lockers and 19 televisions
- * Custom Panther logo stitched into the carpet
- * Hydration area
- * Center-lit helmet cabinet in each locker, along with power, USB connections and ventilation system to dry gear.









With the opening of the Football Operations Suite in 2019, the football program is completely housed at Georgia State Stadium. The new facilities feature the team's strength and conditioning center as well as the team and position meeting rooms, coaches' offices, athletic training room and equipment room, all in one convenient location.







MARK P. BECKER

SINCE BEGINNING HISTENURE as Georgia State University's seventh president in January 2009, President Mark P. Becker has led Georgia State through a dynamic period of growth and advancement and put it on a trajectory to reshape itself and its region.


eflecting his vision of the urban public research university for the 21st century, the university has pursued a 10-year strategic plan through which Georgia State has emerged as one of the nation's leading urban research universities.

Georgia State, one of the most diverse universities in the U.S., is a national model for student success, setting records for its graduation rates and the number of students it graduates, and leading the country in eliminating disparities in student achievement based on race, ethnicity and income. Under Dr. Becker's leadership, Georgia State has built a burgeoning research enterprise, growing sponsored research at more than twice the national rate.

Widely recognized for his work in building a growing national profile for Georgia State, Dr. Becker has been named among the 10 most innovative presidents in the country by Washington Monthly magazine. U.S. News & World Report magazine has ranked Georgia State second among the nation's "most innovative" universities. Dr. Becker is vice-chair of the University Innovation Alliance, a coalition of 11 public research universities working to make college degrees more accessible to all students.

Through the rapid development of its campus and its engagement with civic and business leaders, the university has been recognized as a major catalyst for the revitalization of downtown Atlanta and the economic vitality of its region. Adding to Georgia State's increasing national profile, Dr. Becker has fostered the development of NCAA Division 1 athletics, and the university's intercollegiate teams have won six conference championships since rejoining the Sun Belt Conference in 2013.

Prior to his appointment as president of Georgia State, Dr. Becker was executive



vice president for academic affairs and provost at the University of South Carolina and dean of the School of Public Health and assistant vice president of public health preparedness and emergency response at the University of Minnesota. From 1989 to 2000, Dr. Becker was a professor in the University of Michigan's School of Public Health, where he also was associate dean for academic affairs. He has held academic appointments at the University of Washington, the University of Florida and Cornell University

Dr. Becker attended Harford (Md.) Community College, earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics from Towson State University in 1980 and his doctor's degree in statistics from the Pennsylvania State University in 1985. He grew up in Havre de Grace, Md., near Baltimore.





CHARLIE COBB

CHARLIE COBB enters his seventh year at the helm of the Georgia State Department of Athletics and 16th as a Division I athletics director, leading a transformation for the program throughout campus and the city of Atlanta.

obb was hired in August of 2014 to build a winning program "the right way," per President Mark Becker. Since his hire, multiple new facilities have opened, while student-athletes maintained above a 3.0 grade point average for the 12th-straight year, including a record 3.40 GPA in spring 2020. Georgia State also received the Sun Belt's Institutional Graduation Award twice under his tenure.

Among Cobb's biggest projects has been participating in the acquisition, purchase, and re-purposing of Turner Field, transforming the former Major League Baseball venue into the home of Georgia State football, now named Center Parc Credit Union Stadium in recognition of the \$21 million, 15-year naming rights agreement reached in 2020. Phase One of the project was completed in August 2017 and includes new east side seating and an artificial surface field for the football team. Phase Two moved all football operations to the stadium in 2019 as part of a \$300 million plan to transform the 68-acre site. Future construction plans include the completion of an "Athletics Neighborhood," including a new Convocation Center, baseball stadium, softball stadium, soccer facility and track and field venue.

The Bobby Jones Golf Practice Facility opened for the men's and women's golf teams in 2019.

On the field, the Panthers have garnered unprecedented success as football earned its first-ever appearance in a bowl game in 2015 and two years later won the AutoNation Cure Bowl in Orlando. Men's basketball pulled off a shocking upset in the NCAA Tournament in 2015 and then earned back-to-back NCAA berths in 2018 and 2019. Since rejoining the Sun Belt Conference in 2013, the men's basketball program has

won more games than any other program in the league.

Before taking over the Georgia State program, Cobb spent nine years as the Director of Athletics at Appalachian State. Previously he worked for six years honing his business acumen with the Atlanta Sports Council, the Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl and the Georgia Dome, before returning to his alma mater, NC State.

Through the implementation of the department's strategic plan, Cobb is focused on building a Culture of Success at Georgia State based on five themes: Academic Achievement, Competitive Greatness, Ethical Behavior, Social Responsibility and Community Engagement.

Those ideals helped him build and maintain a high-performing program at App State. The Mountaineers won three consecutive Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) national championships, the first three-peat in FCS history. They also brought home eight consecutive Commissioner's Cup championships (top men's sports program in the Southern Conference) and four Germann Cup championships (top women's program). Together, they earned the men's and women's awards in the same academic year

four times.


At App State, Cobb helped create \$50 million in facilities improvements as the Mountaineers' fundraising efforts reached all-time highs, surpassing the \$3 million mark. The jewel of the construction projects was the seven-story Appalachian Athletics Center, and the campaign also produced new homes for baseball, softball and soccer, as well as a new indoor practice facility.

The 52-year-old Cobb was a four-year letterwinner as a football player at NC State. He graduated with honors with a bachelor's degree in business administration in 1990 and earned a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio in 1992. As a senior center, he was named to the All-ACC second team and was an All-ACC academic selection. He was awarded the prestigious Atlantic Coast Conference's Jim Tatum Award, which recognizes the senior football player with the highest GPA.

Cobb and his wife, Lindsay, have a son and daughter, 23-year-old Harrison,

a recent graduate of Hampden-Sydney College, and 19-year-old Branan, who attends Centre College. Lindsay Cobb was an All-ACC goalkeeper for the NC State women's soccer team from 1987-90 and is the current head soccer coach at Whitefield Academy.







GEORGIA STATE looks to build on the **MOMENTUM** of a successful 2019 season, when the Panthers earned their third **BOWL BERTH** in the last five seasons.

he Panthers return eight starters on offense and seven on defense in head coach Shawn Elliott's fourth season.
On offense, the Panthers graduated only three starters from the most prolific unit in program history. GSU set numerous school records in 2019, including season marks for scoring, total offense and rushing.

Georgia State must replace two-year starting quarterback Dan Ellington, all-time leading rusher Tra Barnett and left tackle Hunter Atkinson, but there is significant talent and experience returning on the offense, both in the skill positions and on the line.

It all starts up front, where the Panthers return four starters, led by three-time All-Sun Belt left guard Shamarious Gilmore.

Georgia State have talented pass catchers at wide receiver in Cornelius McCoy and Sam Pinckney and tight end, where Roger Carter and Aubry Payne form a strong tandem. Juniors Destin Coates and Seth Paige are the top running backs.

On defense, Georgia State returns a pair of All-Sun Belt Conference selections on the defensive line in senior noseguard Dontae Wilson and junior defensive end Hardrick Willis, along with the team's 2019 leading leader tackler in senior inside linebacker Trajan Stephens-McQueen. Wilson, McQueen and cornerback Quavian White enter 2020 on the Preseason All-Sun Belt team.

The Panthers will face a 10-game schedule with non-conference games against Charlotte and East Carolina in addition to the eight-game Sun Belt slate.

QUARTERBACKS

Returnees: Cornelious Brown IV (R-Fr./4 games); Kierston Harvey (R-Fr./3 games) Key Losses: DAN ELLINGTON Newcomers: Jamil Muhammad (R-Fr.), Mikele Colasurdo (Fr.)

The biggest question mark for Georgia State entering the 2020 season is at quarterback, where the Panthers graduated two-year standout Dan Ellington.

Ellington's graduation to the GSU coaching staff--he is now an offensive assistant coach--leaves big shoes to fill. The two-time All-Sun Belt selection passed for 2,447 yards and 22 touchdowns while rushing for 668 yards and six scores.

All four quarterbacks on the 2020 roster are freshmen, including redshirts Cornelious Brown IV, Kierston Harvey and Jamil Muhammad. Brown (4 games, 11-28, 130 yards) and Harvey (3 games, 0-1) saw limited action behind Ellington last season, while Muhammad sat out as a transfer.

True freshman Mikele Colasurdo, who enrolled in January, was the Gatorade Player of the Year in South Carolina.

RUNNING BACKS

After setting numerous school rushing records the last two seasons, Georgia State will look to continue that momentum on the ground. The Panthers graduated the top running back in program history in Tra Barnett, who rushed for 1,453 yards and 12 touchdowns and set new GSU marks for rushing in a game, season and career.

But there is still plenty of talent in the running back room, led by juniors Destin Coates and Seth Paige.

Coates was the team's third-leading rusher a year ago with 546 yards, seven

touchdowns and a team-leading 6.7 yards per carry. Paige added 405 yards and four scores in just seven games, averaging 6.6 yards a rush.

In addition to Barnett and Paige, GSU also returns junior Tucker Gregg, a hard-nosed, downhill runner, and redshirt sophomore Dawson Hill, another talented back who has been hampered by injury his first two years. True freshman Marcus Carroll could be a factor this fall.

SHAWN ELLOTT

A coaching veteran who brought 20 years of experience in winning programs, Shawn Elliott was introduced as Georgia State's third head football coach by President Mark Becker and Director of Athletics Charlie Cobb on Dec. 9, 2016.

hawn Elliott came to GSU after highly successful stints at South Carolina, where he served as the co-offensive coordinator, offensive line coach and interim head coach, and Appalachian State, where he coached the offensive line.

In 23 seasons as a Division I coach, Elliott has been part of 21 winning seasons, 18 teams that reached the NCAA playoffs or a bowl game, and three consecutive NCAA FCS titles from 2005-07.

That success has continued at Georgia State, where Elliott has led the Panthers to bowl games in two of his three seasons in Atlanta.

Other highlights of Elliott's first three years at GSU include the first bowl victory in school history, Georgia State's first winning season as an FBS program, and school-record seven-win campaigns in both 2017 and 2019.

The 2019 season began with another major first for the Georgia State program as Elliott's Panthers earned a dominating 38-30 victory over Tennessee at Neyland Stadium for the school's first win over a Power 5 opponent.

Elliott was named the Dodd Trophy National Coach of the Week, and his Panthers were recognized as the FWAA Reveal Suits National Team of the Week. That is the third time that Elliott has been part of the National Team of the Week; his Appalachian State team was recognized for its 2007 victory at Michigan and his South Carolina squad for its 2010 win over No. 1 Alabama.

The win over Tennessee launched a record-setting 2019 season as the Panthers won seven games in the regular season for the first time and achieved their best home record with a 5-1 mark at Georgia State Stadium.

Bolstered by one of the top rushing attacks in the nation, the 2019 team set numerous team and individual records, most notably establishing new season standards for points, touchdowns, rushing yards and total offense.

Following the regular season, 10 Panthers were named to the 2019 All-Sun Belt Conference squad, and the team earned a berth in the NOVA Home Loans Arizona Bowl.

Despite taking over a Georgia State program playing just its eighth season of football in 2017, Elliott not only guided GSU to a bowl game in his first year at the helm, but he led the Panthers to their first bowl victory, 27-17 over Western Kentucky in the AutoNation Cure Bowl. That win

gave the program a school-record seven victories in Elliott's first season.

Under Elliott's watch, the Panthers achieved benchmark performances on both sides of the ball. The 2017 GSU defense set season records for fewest points allowed per game, and fewest rushing yards allowed per game (136.4) and per attempt (4.13). The defense also recorded the first shutout in school history.

On offense, the Panthers established new marks, since broken, for highest completion percentage (64.2) and fewest interceptions (9) in a season, as well as most total yards in a game (670) and most points vs. an FBS opponent (47).

Nine Panthers earned All-Sun Belt honors in 2017. Senior cornerback Chandon Sullivan shined in the classroom and on the field as Georgia State's first football Academic All-American and the first Panther to be invited to the Reese's Senior Bowl.

Sullivan, one of three 2017 seniors to sign NFL free agent contracts, is now with the Green Bay Packers.

After inheriting a senior-dominated


roster for his first season, Elliott's second campaign proved to be a rebuilding year as the Panthers were forced to play numerous freshmen.

Still, there were many positives during the 2018 season. First-year quarterback Dan Ellington passed for more than 2,000 yards, led the team in rushing and set a school record for fewest interceptions.

Punter Brandon Wright ranked No. 3 in FBS in punting average and net while setting the Sun Belt record at 48.3 yards per kick. The Ray Guy Award semifinalist is GSU's first semifinalist for a major college football award.

Standout receiver Penny Hart finished his career ranked fourth in Sun Belt history in receiving yards and eighth in receptions. He signed a free agent contract with the Indianapolis Colts, as did linebacker Chase Middleton, now with the Atlanta Falcons. Hart is now with the Seattle Seahawks.

Individual honors in Elliott's first three seasons include 26 All-Sun Belt Conference honorees, Georgia State's first two players selected to the Reese's Senior Bowl, seven former players signed to NFL free agent

contracts and a first-round selection in the CFL draft.

The accolades extend to the classroom with GSU's first Academic All-American® as well as five Academic All-District® selections in three seasons. The Panthers posted a program-record 3.03 GPA in his Elliott's first semester and then nearly matched that with a 3.0 for the spring 2020 term.

Before taking over the Georgia State program, Elliott worked seven seasons (2010-16) at South Carolina under Will Muschamp and Steve Spurrier, highlighted





by three consecutive 11-win seasons from 2011-13 during the most successful run in the Gamecocks' history. In addition to coaching the offensive line, he was the running game coordinator in 2010 and 2011, was elevated to co-offensive coordinator in 2012, and then served as the interim head coach following Spurrier's retirement midway through the 2015 season.

Elliott originally joined the South Carolina staff in 2010 and helped the Gamecocks reach five straight bowl games while coaching some of the most prolific and balanced offenses in school history. The Gamecocks turned in the program's best offensive season, statistically, in 2013, averaging 34.1 points while rolling up a school-record 452.3 yards per game.

South Carolina's 2014 unit scored nearly 33 points per game while averaging over 440 yards of offense as All-America and All-Southeastern Conference offensive guard A.J. Cann paved the way. In 2010, Elliott's first season in Columbia, his offensive line blocked for record-setting running back Marcus Lattimore, the National Freshman of the Year.

In addition to Cann, a third-round draft pick by the Jacksonville Jaguars in

2015, Elliott developed future NFL linemen Corey Robinson, Ronald Patrick, Brandon Shell, T.J. Johnson and Rokevious Watkins.

Before going to South Carolina in 2010, Elliott coached his entire career at Appalachian State, his alma mater. In 13 seasons there, he was an integral part of App State's three consecutive NCAA titles from 2005-07 as well as the Mountaineers' historic upset at Michigan in 2007.

Beginning in 1997, he worked two seasons as a defensive assistant (1997-98) and then two seasons as the tight ends coach (1999-00) before taking over the offensive line in 2001.

In nine seasons as the Mountaineers' offensive line coach, Elliott's players earned All-America distinction on 12 occasions, including four different linemen who received first-team All-America accolades. He also coached All-American and future NFL tight end Daniel Wilcox in 2000. In 2003, offensive lineman Wayne Smith was the first pick in the Canadian Football League Draft. From 2005-07, Elliott coached three-consecutive Southern Conference Jacobs Blocking Trophy recipients.

Elliott helped lead the Mountaineers to 10 NCAA playoff berths in 13 seasons with

two trips to the national semifinals and three appearances in the quarterfinals in addition to the three championships.

Elliott was one of three App State coaches to earn the NCAA's Award of Valor for their efforts in rescuing two individuals from an automobile accident in 2000.

The two head coaches under whom Elliott spent the bulk of his time as an assistant coach, Spurrier at South Carolina and Jerry Moore at Appalachian State, are both enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame.

Elliott was the first player in Mountaineer annals to appear in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs four separate seasons. He was a four-year letterwinner, helping the Mountaineers to two Southern Conference titles and a combined record of 36-16. He served as a co-captain of the 1995 Appalachian State squad that finished 12-1 while earning all-league distinction as a defensive end.

A native of Camden, S.C., Elliott earned his bachelor's degree from Appalachian State in 1996. He is married to the former Summer Scruggs, also an App State grad and a standout tennis player for the Mountaineers, and the couple has two children, Maddyn and Max.





NATE FUQUA

Defensive Coordinator / Outside Linebackers Fourth Year at GSU @OLBeastCoachO3

ate Fuqua is in his fourth season as Georgia State's defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach after joining head coach Shawn Elliott's staff in 2017.

In 2019, Fuqua's defense played a key role in the Panthers' landmark victory at Tennessee, holding the Volunteers to just 93 yards rushing. Another top performance was allowing just 63 yards passing in the win over Army. The Panthers collected 21 sacks on the season, second-most in program history.

In three seasons, his defense has produced eight all-conference honorees and five pro players.

In his first season running the Panther defense, Fuqua was nominated for the 2017 Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach. His unit set GSU season records for fewest points per game (24.75), fewest rushing yards per game (136.4), fewest yards per rushing attempt (4.13) and most sacks (24). The Panthers also recorded the first shutout in school history while setting single-game records for fewest rushing yards allowed (minus-2) and most sacks (seven).

Fuqua coached All-Sun Belt Conference outside linebacker Michael Shaw, while his defense also featured four other all-conference honorees, including Academic All-America cornerback and Senior Bowl invitee Chandon Sullivan.

Following the 2017 season, three GSU defenders signed NFL free agent contracts in Sullivan, defensive end Mackendy Cheridor and cornerback B.J. Clay, while noseguard Julien Laurent was a first-round selection in the 2018 CFL Draft. Inside linebacker Chase Middleton joined the pro ranks following the 2018 season.

Fuqua came to Georgia State from Wofford, which he helped to a 10-4 record and a berth in the FCS quarterfinals in 2016 as he directed a defense that ranked fifth in the nation in total defense (287.2 ypg), sixth in scoring defense (17.1 ppg) and 12th in rushing defense (101.8 ypg). The Terriers, who fell to Youngstown State in double overtime in the FCS quarterfinals, posted three shutouts during the season.

Fuqua spent 12 seasons at Wofford, his alma mater, including the last three years as defensive coordinator. In each of his three seasons running the defense, the Terriers had the top rushing defense in the Southern Conference while ranking fourth in the FCS in 2014 and 12th in 2016.



Fuqua originally joined the Wofford staff in 2005, assisting with the linebackers for two seasons before taking over as the outside linebackers coach in 2007. From then on, he helped the Terriers reach the FCS playoffs in six of his last 10 years on the staff and winning three Southern Conference championships.

Among the top players he coached was All-American and three-time all-conference outside linebacker Alvin Scioneaux. He tutored numerous other all-conference and all-freshman selections during his time at Wofford.

A nose tackle in college, Fuqua was a four-time All-Southern Conference player and two-time All-American for the Terriers, including first-team recognition as a senior in 2002. He was elected to the Wofford College Athletic Hall of Fame in 2008.

Fuqua (pronounced FEW-quay), 39, is a native of Danville, Ky., where he was an all-state player at Danville High School. He is married to the former Tiffany Webb and the couple has a daughter, Natalie Marie, and a son, Webb Kirkland.





BRAD GLENN

Offensive Coordinator / Quarterbacks Second Year at GSU

ffensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Brad Glenn enters his second season at Georgia State after directing a record-setting unit in 2019, earning a nomination for the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach.

In his first season in Atlanta, Glenn orchestrated the most prolific offensive season in program history with school records for points, scoring average, total offense, total offense per game, rushing yards, rushing yards per game and per attempt and first downs.

Eight offensive players earned All-Sun Belt honors, including quarterback Dan Ellington, who passed for 2,447 yards and 22 touchdowns while rushing for 668 yards and six scores, despite playing the final four games with a torn knee ligament.

The Panthers ranked No. 13 in FBS in rushing with 241.6 yards per game, led by Sun Belt rushing leader Tra Barnett.

Glenn joined the GSU staff in February 2019 after seven seasons as the associate head coach, offensive coordinator and quarterbacks

coach at Western Carolina. He previously served seven years at Appalachian State on the same offensive staff as head coach Shawn Elliott as the Mountaineers won three straight NCAA FCS titles (2005-07).

Glenn's tenure at Western Carolina (2012-18) was marked by outstanding play from his quarterbacks. For the last five seasons, the Catamounts' starting quarterback has averaged over 2,400 yards passing and more than 600 yards rushing. His first quarterback, Troy Mitchell, finished as the school's career leader in total offense with 9,397 yards, while Mitchell's successor, Tyrie Adams is poised to break many of Mitchell's records. In 2016, Adams was the Southern Conference Freshman of the Year and a finalist for the STATS FCS National Freshman of the Year honor.

In his time at Appalachian State, Glenn coached tight ends for one season (2005) and slot receivers for three years (2006-08) before taking over as quarterbacks coach (2009-11).

While at Appalachian State, Glenn coached two Southern Conference Offensive

Players of the Year in quarterbacks Armanti Edwards, who also won the Walter Payton Award as the top player in the FCS, and DeAndre Pressley.

A total of six individuals who played in Glenn's offensive system, including three at Western Carolina and three at App State, were named to the Walter Payton Award Watch Liet

Glenn began his coaching career as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Greer (S.C.) High School from 1995-2000, helping lead the program to a 25-3 record and back-to-back Upper State runner-up finishes his final two seasons. He earned his first collegiate position in 2001, coaching tight ends at Elon before spending the next two seasons as the offensive coordinator at North Greenville College. He returned to prep ranks for one season (2004) at Seneca (S.C.) High School before moving to App State.

The native of Seneca, S.C., is a 1995 graduate of Clemson. He is married to the former Anna Thompson, and the couple has two daughters, Zoey and Landry, and a son, Hank.

Offensive Line Second Year at GSU

homas Austin, a former National Football League offensive lineman and staff member for two-time national champion Clemson, was named Georgia State's offensive line coach in January 2019.

In his first season at GSU, Austin's line was a key component in the most prolific offense in program history with school records for points, scoring average, total offense, total offense per game, rushing yards, rushing yards per game, rushing yards per attempt and first downs. The offensive line paved the way for Sun Belt Conference rushing leader Tra Barnett, who ranked No. 11 in FBS with 111.8



rushing yards per game. As a team, GSU ranked 13th in FBS in rushing yards per game.

Four of Austin's linemen earned postseason honors in 2019. Left tackle Hunter Atkinson, left guard Shamarious Gilmore and center Malik Sumter earned All-Sun Belt honors, and right tackle Travis Glover was named the FWAA-Shaun Alexander Freshman All-America team, the second Freshman All-America in school history.

Following the season, Atkinson signed a free agent contract with the Atlanta Falcons.

Before coming to GSU, Austin spent the previous four seasons (2015-18) at Clemson, his alma mater, working with the offensive staff as the Tigers reached the College Football Playoff each year, including titles in 2016 and 2018 and a runner-up

hris Collins, Georgia State's safeties coach since joining the staff for the 2017 season, took on the added responsibility of recruiting coordinator beginning in 2019.

Collins helped GSU sign a 2020 recruiting class that had the highest average player ranking in program history, according to 247Sports.

He was also chosen for the 2018 American Football Coaches Association 35 Under 35 Coaches Leadership Institute.

In 2017 in his first year with the Panthers, Collins helped coached a

defensive unit that set the Georgia State season record for fewest points allowed per game (24.75) while tutoring All-Sun Belt Conference safety Bryan Williams.

Collins came to GSU after one season at Western Carolina, where he coached the linebackers, including all-conference selection Tyson Dickson. He spent the 2015 season as a defensive graduate assistant coach at Appalachian State, helping the Mountaineers to an 11-2 record and a victory in the Raycom Media Camellia Bowl and working with all-conference honoree Devan Stringer.

He previously spent two seasons

(2013-14)as secondary coach and special teams coordinator at Catawba College in Salisbury, N.C., while also serving as the academic coordinator for the NCAA Division II program. At Catawba, Collins coached All-America defensive back L.J. McCray, who went on to play three seasons in the NFL after signing as a free agent, as well as two all-conference selections.


Collins began his coaching career at Western Carolina, his alma mater, by serving as a student assistant in 2010 and then a defensive assistant in 2011-12.

fter completing a standout playing career, former Georgia State quarterback Dan Ellington enters his first season on the GSU staff after being named an assistant coach in May 2020.

Ellington serves as an offensive assistant coach and will work with several positions, primarily with the running backs while also spending time with the quarterbacks and receivers.

The Panthers' starting quarterback the last two years (2018-19), Ellington was a two-time All-Sun Belt Conference selection as a dual threat who achieved numerous records and milestones. He finished with the highest career completion percentage in GSU history (62.0 percent) while ranking second with 34 touchdowns passes. He ranks third in every other career passing category, including 4,566 yards passing on 401 completions with just 13 interceptions. He also stands fourth on the GSU career rushing list with 1,293 yards and 11 touchdowns.

As a senior in 2019, he passed for 2,447 yards and 22 touchdowns and rushed for 668 yards and six scores to lead the GSU to seven victories and a bowl berth. He authored one of the signature moments in Georgia State sports history when he led the Panthers to their season-opening 38-30 victory at Tennessee.

Beyond the statistics, Ellington was a tremendous leader who displayed remarkable selflessness and grit in playing the final four games of his senior season with a torn anterior cruciate ligament in



his right knee.

A native of Olive Branch, Miss., Ellington starred at Center Hill High School and then was an NJCAA All-American at Itawamba (Miss.) Community College before coming to Georgia State.

He earned his degree in education from Georgia State in May 2020.

Inside Linebackers First Year at GSU

rian Landis joined the Georgia State staff as inside linebackers coach in February 2020 after three seasons as the head coach at Frederick Douglass High School in Lexington, Ky.

He previously served on the coaching staffs at Kentucky, Eastern Kentucky and Georgetown (Ky.) College.

Landis compiled a 35-5 record at Frederick Douglass after starting the program from scratch in 2017 at the newly-opened school. In 2019, he led the Broncos to a 14-1 record and a berth in the Class 5A state finals.

His first team posted a 10-3 record and reached the 2017 state quarterfinals, and in 2018, Frederick Douglass went 11-1 and earned a No. 1 ranking in 6A.

Landis went to Frederick Douglass after one season (2016) at Kentucky as a defensive quality control coach working with linebackers, and one year (2015) as the defensive backs and special teams coach at Eastern Kentucky.

He spent a total of 12 seasons (2001, 2004-14) coaching at Georgetown, his alma mater, where he was part of NAIA national championships as a player (2000) and coach (2001).

Landis coached the Georgetown defensive backs from 2006-14 and also served as the Tigers' recruiting coordinator from 2010-14. During that time, he helped Georgetown to four conference titles and NAIA playoff appearances, including a No. 1 national ranking during the 2012 season.

Landis enjoyed a standout playing career at Georgetown, culminating with a senior season in which he captained the Tigers' to the 2000 NAIA title team and was named the Defensive Player of the Game for the championship. The following year he served as a graduate assistant coach as Georgetown won its second straight NAIA championship.

He had a brief professional career in arena football before returning to Georgetown as assistant linebackers and special teams coach in 2004, when the Tigers reached the NAIA national semifinals.

Landis graduated from Georgetown in 2001 with B.S. degree in business administration, and he completed his master's in special education in 2006.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Landis and wife Ashley have two sons, Park, 10, and Jack, 7.





TRENT McKNIGHT

Receivers
Fourth Year at GSU

ow in his fourth season at Georgia State, Trent McKnight's receiving corps have been key performers in some of the most prolific offenses in program history.

In 2019, McKnight helped coach the top offensive unit in GSU history, including school records for points, scoring average, total offense, total offense per game and first downs. All-Sun Belt Conference receiver Cornelius McCoy had 70 catches for 757 yards and five touchdowns, and the junior ranks sixth in GSU history in receptions and yards after just 25 games. McKnight's group of receivers remained productive despite seasonending injuries to two of its three starters.

In his first two seasons at Georgia State, McKnight coached All-Sun Belt receiver Penny Hart, who finished his career ranked fourth in Sun Belt Conference history in receiving yards and seventh in receptions.



In 2017, Hart led the Sun Belt with a school-record 74 receptions for 1,121 yards and eight touchdowns,. Following the 2018 season, Hart earned an invitation to the Reese's Senior Bowl and signed an NFL free agent contract; he is now with the Seattle Seahawks

Before coming to GSU in 2017, McKnight previously coached at Samford, where he filled several roles on the offensive staff in four seasons there while helping the program to four straight winning seasons, highlighted by a Southern Conference championship and NCAA FCS playoff berth in 2013.

He served as run game coordinator and tight ends coach for the 2015 season, when the Bulldogs ranked No. 7 in the nation in total offense (479.7 ypg) and No. 3 in passing offense while leading the SoCon in scoring with 34.6 points per game.

As Samford's passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach in 2014, McKnight tutored all-conference wide receiver Karel Hamilton, the SoCon's top pass catcher that year who went on to earn first-team All-America honors in 2016 while leading the nation with 10.1 receptions per game.

Hamilton was one of four receivers and tight ends who earned all-conference or all-freshman recognition under McKnight.

For the 2012 and 2013 seasons, McKnight coached the Samford tight ends and inside receivers, helping the 2013 Bulldogs lead the SoCon in passing offense while ranking second in total offense and scoring en route to the conference title and playoff bid.

He returned to Samford, his alma mater, after one season (2011) as the wide receivers coach at Georgia Military College in Milledgeville.



ormer National Football League defensive lineman Travian Robertson enters his second season as Georgia State's defensive line coach.

In his first season in that role, he coached a pair of All-Sun Belt Conference linemen in noseguard Dontae Wilson and defensive end Hardrick Willis. Robertson helped the Panthers increase their sack total from 13 in 2018 to 21 in 2019.

A former graduate assistant on the Georgia State staff, Robertson returned to Atlanta in June 2019 after one season as the defensive line coach at Albany State. He helped the Rams to a 7-4 record, including the SIAC East title, in 2018.

Robertson originally served on head coach Shawn Elliott's staff in 2017 as a graduate assistant working with the defensive line as the Panthers posted a 7-5 record, capped by the program's first

bowl victory over Western Kentucky in the 2017 AutoNation Cure Bowl. The GSU defense set school records that year for fewest points allowed per game, fewest rushing yards allowed per game (136.4) and fewest yards per rushing attempt (4.13) as well as most sacks in a game (seven) and season (24.0).

Robertson was an outstanding defensive lineman himself, lettering four years at South Carolina, where he earned Southeastern Conference All-Academic honors and served as team captain in 2011.

He was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons in the seventh round of the 2012 NFL Draft and played for the Falcons as well as the Seattle Seahawks and Washington Redskins over four seasons.

Robertson is a native of Laurinburg, N.C. He and his wife Kettiany have three sons: Travian, Jr., Trenton and Tristan.

Tight Ends/Running Backs Fourth Year at GSU

ow in his fourth season at Georgia State, Josh Stepp will coach the Panthers' tight ends and running backs in 2020.

While coaching the tight ends in 2019, Stepp produced a pair of All-Sun Belt Conference selections in Aubry Payne and Roger Carter. Those two were key weapons in both the running game and passing attack, helping the GSU offense set school records for points, scoring average, total offense, total offense per game, rushing yards, rushing yards per game, rushing yards per attempt and first downs.

Formerly the head football coach and athletic director at Lexington (S.C.) High School, Stepp joined head coach Shawn Elliott's staff in 2017. He coached both running backs and tight ends in his first year, including All-Sun Belt Conference all-purpose back Glenn Smith, and then focused on the tight ends in 2018-19.

Stepp was chosen for the 2019 American

Football Coaches Association 35 Under 35 Coaches Leadership Institute.

In four seasons at Lexington, Stepp posted a 36-17 record from 2013-16, despite inheriting a program that had gone 3-8 the year before he arrived. The Wildcats posted winning records and reached at least the second round of the playoffs in each of his four seasons.

The highlight of his tenure came in 2015, when he led his squad to a 13-game winning streak and a berth in the state championship game. Along the way, Lexington knocked off top-seeded and nationally-ranked Spartanburg to advance to the Class 4A, Division II state finals for the first time in 15 years. Stepp was honored as 4A Lower State Coach of the Year and Region V Coach of the Year.

He began his coaching career as an assistant at Pelion (S.C.) High School, his alma mater, in 2007 and continued with assistant coaching assignments at Blythewood High School (2008) and Spring Valley High School, where he served as offensive coordinator in 2009

Stepp earned his first head coaching position at Dreher High School, where he

coached three seasons (2010-12) before taking over as head coach and athletic director at Lexington. He led Dreher to an 8-2 mark in 2012 for the school's best season in more than a decade.

A three-sport standout at Pelion, including all-state honors in football and baseball, Stepp began his college career at Furman. He transferred to Newberry (S.C.) College and enjoyed a enjoyed a record-setting three-year career at quarterback (2004-06), including All-America and National Player of the Week honors. He finished as Newberry's all-time leader in passing yards, touchdowns and completions, and he was recently inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame. He is also a member of the Pelion High School Hall of Fame.

He graduated cum laude from Newberry in 2007 with a B.S. degree in physical education and then added a master's in education from the University of Phoenix.

Stepp and his wife Caryn have three daughters, Rilee Hope, Emma Paisley and Hadley James. He has a twin brother, Justin, who is the receivers coach at Arkansas.





JOHN SISK Head Strength Coach

John Sisk, who possesses nearly three decades of experience in the field of strength and conditioning, highlighted by 17 years with Power Five programs, is in his second year as the head strength coach for Georgia State football. He joined the Georgia State program in January 2019

after seven years at Georgia Tech and previously worked 10 seasons at Vanderbilt.

Sisk's strength and conditioning program paid immediate dividends for the GSU program, helping the Panthers to a school-record seven regular-season victories and a berth in the NOVA Home Loans Arizona Bowl. Following the season, offensive tackle Hunter Atkinson and punter Brandon Wright signed NFL free agent contracts.

In his seven seasons as Georgia Tech's director of player development, Sisk helped develop and train 26 student-athletes who signed National Football League contracts, including nine NFL draft picks. He was a vital part of the program's five bowl berths and 2014 Capital One Orange Bowl victory and Top 10 national ranking.

He went to Georgia Tech in 2012 after one season as director of strength training and conditioning at Furman (2011), but prior to that, Sisk served as the director of speed, strength and conditioning at Vanderbilt for 10 years (2001-10). At Vanderbilt, Sisk coached four strength and conditioning all-Americans at Vandy, including former NFL quarterback Jay Cutler. Cutler and former Chicago Bears offensive linemen Chris Williams both went through Sisk's strength-training program at Vandy before being selected in the first round of the National Football League Draft. Sisk directed the strength training regimen for 12 Vanderbilt players that signed NFL contracts, as well as four Major League Baseball first-round draft picks, including No. 1 selection and future Cy Young Award winner David Price.

Sisk first worked in college athletics as an assistant strength coach at Furman for two years (1993-94) before serving as the head strength and conditioning coach at his alma mater, Western Carolina, for two years (1995-96). He moved on to Clemson for four years (1997-2000) before his 10-year stint at Vanderbilt.

A Waynesville, N.C., native, Sisk played football at Western Carolina and graduated from WCU with a degree in sports administration. Upon graduating, he spent three years as a football and strength coach at Tuscola (N.C.) High School.

In 2011, Sisk was one of eight recognized as a Master Strength and Conditioning Coach (MSCC) by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association.

Sisk is married to the former Missy Cornell of Dayton, Ohio.



ALEX DERENTHAL Assistant Strength Coach

Alex Derenthal enters his second season as an assistant strength coach working with Georgia State football. In his first year at GSU, he was part of the Panthers' 2019 bowl team that set a school-record for regular-season victories.

He joined the GSU staff in 2019 after

two seasons working with the football team at Georgia Tech.

Before returning to Georgia Tech in 2017, Derenthal spent four years as the head strength and conditioning coach at Reinhardt University in Waleska, Ga., where he oversaw all aspects of strength and conditioning for the school's 21 varsity sports. With Derenthal at the helm of its strength training, Reinhardt football won the 2016 Mid-South Conference, advanced to the NAIA national semifinals and was ranked No. 3 in the final NAIA poll. The Eagles also earned a playoff berth and top-10 national ranking in 2015 and produced 44 all-conference players and two all-Americans in four seasons.

In his first stint at Georgia Tech (2011-13), Derenthal interned with the football, baseball, softball, swimming and diving, and track and field programs.

Before getting into the strength and conditioning field, Derenthal served as a football graduate extern at Temple.

Derenthal was a four-year letterwinner and two-time team captain as an offensive lineman at Temple (2004-08). He signed a free-agent contract with the New York Giants in 2009 before returning to college athletics at his alma mater.

He graduated from Temple in 2008 with a B.S. in kinesiology and earned a M.S. in exercise science from California (Pa.) in 2012. He is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist through the NSCA and also has obtained a Performance Enhancement Specialist certificate through NASM.

Curtis Turner joined the Georgia State staff as an assistant strength coach in 2019 after six years as a player development coach at Georgia Tech.





Georgia State scored a pair of fourth quarter touchdowns and out-rushed Tennessee 213-93 to shock the Volunteers 38-30 at Neyland Stadium.

Georgia State, celebrating just its 10th season of football, knocked off its first SEC opponent and Power 5 opponent by out-scoring Tennessee 24-13 in the second half, including 17 straight points.

"First of all, I will go ahead and say how proud I am of our university and our football program to come in here and do something probably only 108 or 109 players we have on our roster believed we could do," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "I don't know if anyone else in the country believed that a program just a mere 10 years old could come in here to Neyland Stadium at the University of Tennessee and beat them. We believed. We notched a signature win for our university and our football program.

"It has been an unbelievable day," Elliott continued. "I am just so proud of our players because, ultimately, they work so hard to do the things necessary to put us in a position to even to go and compete. It was a joy to sit back and watch the confidence in our guys' eyes and hearts."

Senior quarterback Dan Ellington finished 11-of-24 for 139 yards and two touchdowns while adding 61 yards on 14 rushes. His 22-yard touchdown run with 4:45 to play effectively sealed the win.

Tra Barnett led the Panthers on the ground with 95 yards on 21 rushes. His 19-yard touchdown run gave Georgia State a 28-23 lead with 8:56 to play in the game.

After Tennessee took a 23-21 lead on Brent Cimaglia's 31-yard field goal with 12 minutes left, Ellington drove the Panthers 75 yards for the go-ahead score. After he connected with Terrance Dixon for a 14-yard completion and a first down at the UT 30, Barnett gained 11 yards on second down

and then took it to the end zone on the next play.

Tennessee took the ensuing kickoff and moved out to midfield when GSU cornerback Evan Jones sacked Jarrett Guarantano and forced a fumble. GSU's Jhi'Shawn Taylor recovered at the UT 39, setting up Ellington's clinching touchdown five plays later.

Now leading 35-23 with under five minutes left, GSU kicked off to the Vols, and the defense came up with a sack by Victor Heyward and an interception by Trajan Stephens-McQueen at the UT 36.

Georgia State got off to a strong start in the game, forcing a fumble on Tennessee's second play from scrimmage and punching it in for an early lead.

Hardrick Willis forced a fumble and Ed Curney recovered at the UT 23. Ellington had a pair of 8-yard runs, and on 3rd-and-goal from the 2-yard line, Seth Paige burst up the middle and into the end zone for the first touchdown of the 2019 season to put the Panthers up 7-0 four minutes into the game.

Tennessee countered with a 16-play, 78-yard drive that lasted 7:42, tying the game on Jarrett Guarantano's 6-yard TD pass to Marquez Callaway. The Vols took the lead on Ty Chander's 31-yard scoring run with nine seconds left in the first quarter.

The Panthers engineered a long scoring drive midway through the second quarter. After the GSU defense held the Vols on 3rd-and-1 at the UT 34 to force a punt, Ellington drove the Panthers 81 yards on 16 plays and 6:32, capped by a 17-yard touchdown pass over the middle to Cornelius McCoy. That tied the game at 14-all with three minutes left in the half.

On the drive, Georgia State had three key conversions. First on 4th-and-1 at the GSU 39, Tra Barnett's 2-yard run kept the drive alive, and Ellington gained two yards on 3rd-and-1 at the UT 33. Then Ellington hit McCoy for a 12-yard completion and a first down at the UT 18 to set up the touchdown two plays later.

A 19-yard field goal with one second in the half gave UT a 17-14 lead halftime lead.

The Panthers took the opening kickoff of the second half and drove down the field. Seth Paige had a 15-yard run on the drive, and then Ellington hit Barnett for 15 yards and Payne for 11 yards to the UT

25. On second down, Devin Gentry took a reverse pitch and raced around the left end for 15 yards, hurdling a defender at the end of the play for a first down at the 6.

Then Ellington found Payne, the junior tight end and transfer from Western Carolina, on the left sideline. Payne caught the ball at the two and dove in for the score, giving the Panthers a 21-17 lead with 10:22 left in the third quarter.

"I think that was the most important possession of the game," Elliott said.

Tennessee answered with two scoring drives but had to settle for a pair of field goals.

Before a crowd of 20,351 at Georgia State Stadium, quarterback Dan Ellington threw a school-record five touchdown passes and Georgia State rallied from a 20-3 first-half deficit for a 48-42 win over Furman Saturday night.

Using the biggest comeback in program history, Georgia State improved to 2-0 for the first time in its brief history following the upset win over Tennessee last week in Knoxville.

"I knew we would have to go out there and fight," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "We faced adversity. We did not fold. We did not flinch. We struck back.

"It has been an incredible seven days. It is the first time Georgia State football has started 2-0. I am so proud of our guys. They deserve all the credit for this win. It was a total team effort, even though it was not sharp."

Ellington threw his five touchdowns to five different receivers, going 29-of-37 for a career-high 362 yards. He also rushed 15 times for 86 yards, and his 448 total yards of offense is the third-most in a single-game in program history.

Georgia State's 48 points scored were the secondmost in school history and only behind the 55 scored against Savannah State during the program's inaugural year of 2010. The Panthers combined for 566 total yards which is tied for fourth-most in GSU annals.

After falling behind 20-3, Georgia State scored 28 straight points to take its first lead three minutes into the second half.

Trailing 20-17 at the half, GSU took the opening kickoff and marched 85 yards on eight plays. Ellington had a 16-yard run down to the Furman 26, and then his 26-yard touchdown pass to Sam Pinckney gave the Panthers their first lead at 24-20 three minutes into the second half.

The GSU defense used a sack by Dontae Wilson and a pass breakup by Remy Lazarus to force a three-and-out, setting up another Panther touchdown. Ellington hit Devin Gentry for a 43-yard completion down to the 5-yard line, and on third down, he found tight Roger Carter for the 2-yard touchdown pass to put the Panthers up 30-20 with seven minutes to play in the third quarter.

Furman, the No. 11 ranked FCS team, pulled within 38-28 with a touchdown and two-point conversion, but the Panthers answered with Ellington's 20-yard touchdown to tight end Aubry Payne to move ahead 38-28 late in the third quarter.

After another Furman touchdown, GSŪ found a little breathing room on an Ellington-to-Cornelius McCoy 44-yard touchdown over the middle and Brandon Wright's 38-yard field, which made it 48-35 with seven minutes to play. But after Furman scored with 3:26 left, the Panthers had to make one last stop when the Paladins got the ball back on their own 10-yard line with 2:18 left. The GSU defense held on four downs, including an incomplete pass on 4th-and-5 from the 15, to seal the win.

Georgia State got off to a slow start both offensively and defensively and fell behind the Paladins 20-3 before scoring two late touchdowns to pull within 20-17 at the intermission.

The Panthers' first touchdown came on a 16-play, 94-yard drive, capped by Tra Barnett's 18-yard scoring run. That pulled GSU within 20-10 with 2:47 left in the half.

After the Panthers forced a punt, they took over at their own 34 with 1:27 on the clock. Ellington hit McCoy with three straight completions to the Furman 30 and then connected with Pinckney to the 14. On 2nd-and-6 from the 10 with time running down, Ellington found Terrance Dixon over the middle, and Dixon stretched the ball over the goal line for the score on the final play of the half.

"You saw Terrance catch that ball and will himself in there. He stretched his arms out and put that ball across," Elliott said. "The momentum swing at that point was amazing. Just the way he got in, zeros on the clock. We head in with great momentum for the second half and we understand we really can take control."

Cornelius McCoy (10 catches, 143 yards), Dixon (8 catches, 68 yards), and Pinckney (7 catches, 80 yards) all set career-high for receptions and yards, while Dixon and Pinckney earned their first touchdown catches.

"Let me tell you, the crowd was amazing," Elliott said. "I want you to know, the students in the north end zone were FANTASTIC. I felt the energy coming from the stands. I could feel the excitement in the voices and the cheering. The band was phenomenal.

Furman quarterback Darren Grainger went 16-of-25 for 323 yards and four touchdowns, while Devin Wynn led the Paladin ground attack with 13 rushes for 83 yards.



GEORGIA STATE 10 WESTERN MICHIGAN 57

Georgia State suffered its first loss of the season as the Panthers fell 57-10 at Western Michigan.

Tra Barnett recorded his second career 100-yard rushing game for Georgia State (2-1), finishing with 127 yards on 19 carries.

Western Michigan (2-1) was led by Levante Bellamy, who rushed 15 times for 192 yards and three touchdowns. Quarterback Jon Wassink was 15-of-20 for 246 yards and a touchdown for the Broncos, who finished the night with 694 yards of total offense, including 450 yards rushing.

Trailing 17-3 late in the first quarter, the Panthers took over at their own 25, and on the first play, quarterback Dan Ellington broke through the middle for a career-long 64-yard run. Then he tossed a 20-yard touchdown pass to Aubry Payne, who made a spectacular juggling catch. The junior tight end has caught a touchdown in each of the first three games.

But then the Broncos reeled off 26 straight points to take a 43-10 lead into the locker room.

"They were able to do about anything they wanted to us offensively," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "The inability to stop the run is the most obvious thing. It was a poor effort defensively.

"After we got behind, we were pressing offensively and couldn't get anything going. We tried to come out and do something in the second half and just got further behind."

Ellington finished the game 11-of-20 for 126 yards passing and a touchdown, while rushing nine times for 44 yards.

The Panthers hurt themselves with three turnovers and an uncharacteristic nine penalties for 95 yards.

One bright spot for Georgia State was punter Brandon Wright, who averaged 49.2 yards on eight punts, including a 56-yard boot that was downed at the 1-yard line and a 55-yarder downed at the 4. He also kicked a 32-yard field goal.

GEORGIA STATE 34 TEXAS STATE (30T) 37

Game 4: Sept. 21, 2019 • 7 p.m. ET (ESPN+) Bobcat Stadium • San Marcos, Texas

Texas State kicked a 35-yard field goal in triple overtime to earn a 37-34 win over Georgia State at Bobcat Stadium. It was the first overtime game for the Panthers since 2013 and first-ever triple overtime game.

The winning kick came after Brandon Wright missed a 36-yard field goal attempt on Georgia State's possession to open the third overtime period. However, it was Wright's 20-yard kick as time expired in regulation that tied the game and gave the Panthers a chance during the extra periods.

"Certainly a very disappointing, disappointing ball game," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "What a hard-fought contest. Everyone laid it on the line and gave great effort, but we came up short. Tough situation to be in. A very tough loss for us."

In double-overtime, both kickers just missed field goals from more than 40 yards to send it into the third overtime.

Both teams scored touchdowns in the first overtime period as Dan Ellington hit Sam Pinckney on a 13-yard touchdown pass to give Georgia State a 34-27 lead before the Bobcats responded to tie the game.

Wright's tying field goal came on the final play of regulation. Ellington drove Panthers down the field and spiked the ball. After a review by the officials, one second was put back on the clock setting up the game-tying field goal.

After winning its first two games, Georgia State dropped its second-straight contest and fell to 2-2 and 0-1 in Sun Belt play heading into next week's bye. Texas State snapped a 12-game home losing streak in conference games and improved to 1-3 overall and 1-0 in conference play.

"We gave them 10 points on the turnovers, with the fumbled punt and the interception, and then at the end there [of regulation], we mismanaged the clock a little bit," Elliott said. "We didn't get out of bounds when we should have and that eliminated a play. We were very fortunate to have an opportunity to kick the field goal. On that last drive, we didn't put ourselves in position to win. That's on us."

Ellington finished 23-of-35 for 213 yards and three touchdowns, while Destin Coates led the rushing game with 98 yards on 19 attempts and a touchdown.

Senior Tra Barnett finished with 55 yards on 12 attempts and became the sixth Panther in program history to eclipse 1,000 career rushing yards.

Pinckney led all Panther receivers with seven catches for 95 yards and a touchdown. Cornelius McCoy added six catches for 66 yards and a touchdown.

Trailing 20-17 as the fourth quarter began, the Panthers took the lead with a 13-play, 56-yard drive that ate up 6:48 seconds on the clock with Coates scoring the touchdown on a 7-yard run.

Texas State responded with a seven-play, 75-yard drive capped off by Anthony Taylor's touchdown to retake the lead 27-24 with 4:56 to play.

After Texas State kicked a field goal on its first possession of the game, the Panthers answered with a 75-yard touchdown drive. Ellington hit Pinckney with a 27-yard completion to convert on 3rd-and-15 for a first down at the 18, and two plays later, he hit McCoy for a 17-yard touchdown pass to put GSU ahead 7-3 midway through the first quarter.

After the Bobcats recovered a muffed punt for a touchdown to take a 10-7 lead, Ellington directed a 9-play, 73-yard drive. Three straight runs by Barnett got the Panthers to the 20-yards line, and on 3-and-8, Ellington gained 15 yards on a keeper up the middle, making a great move on the defender for a first down at the 5. On the next play he found tight end Aubry Payne for a 5-yard touchdown to give the Panthers a 14-10 lead with nine minutes to play in the first half.

Payne has caught a touchdown pass in each of the first four games.

Following a Texas State touchdown with 3:43 left in the first half, the Panthers tied the game on Brandon Wright's 38-yard field goal for a 17-17 deadlock at the intermission.

Georgia State used a record-setting offensive performance to earn a 52-38 win over Arkansas State on homecoming Saturday at Georgia State Stadium.

Georgia State (3-2, 1-1 Sun Belt) scored the first 21 points of the game and held off Arkansas State (3-3, 1-1) in the second half, sealing the win on Destin Coates' 2-yard touchdown with 2:05 to play.

Senior quarterback Dan Ellington, who was celebrating his 22nd birthday Saturday, finished with a career-high 382 yards passing on 29-of-41 attempts. He added 69 yards on 19 rushing attempts for the Panthers, who scored the most points in program history against an FBS opponent. Ellington had one TD pass and one rushing score.

Georgia State rushed for a school-record 340 yards along with a school-record six rushing touchdowns, while combining for 722 total yards, which is also a school record. The Panthers tied the Sun Belt Conference record with 39 first downs and controlled the clock with a school-record 39:19 of possession time.

"What a display from us offensively tonight," head coach Shawn Elliott said after the Panthers defeated Arkansas State for the first time. "For the offense to go out and do what they did, both running the football and throwing the football, as really impressive. What a phenomenal win on homecoming."

Sophomore receiver Sam Pinckney finished with a career-high 120 yards receiving on nine catches, including a touchdown catch, while Cornelius McCoy added eight catches for 107 yards as Georgia State had two 100-yard receivers for the first time since 2016.

The running back trio of Tra Barnett, Seth Paige and Destin Coates combined for 273 yards and five rushing touchdowns. Barnett went for 139 yards on 14 carries and a touchdown, Coates tied the GSU single-game record with three touchdowns to go along with 66 yards on 15 carries, and Paige added 68 yards and a touchdown.

With his third career 100-yard game, Barnett raised his career rushing total to 1,171 yards to climb into third place in GSU history.

Barnett had perhaps the key play of the game with his 56-yard run in the fourth quarter. After Arkansas State pulled within 45-38 on a field goal with 4:27 still to play, Barnett started the Panthers' ensuing possession with a 14-yard gain and then raced 56 yards down to the 5-yard line. Two plays later, Coates punched it in to give GSU a 52-38 lead with two minutes left and effectively seal the win.

"There's such balance in the offense whether it be running the football or throwing the football, it's just great balance," Elliott said. "But you see it every day in practice. These guys come out every day to practice and really enjoy practice. They really have fun in practice. And our backs are so unselfish."

Georgia State jumped to a 21-0 lead midway through the second quarter as Ellington directed scoring drives of 75, 89 and 80 yards, each capped by a rushing touchdown by a different running back.

Barnett started the scoring with a 3-yard scoring run, followed by Coates' 27-yard touchdown and Paige's 7-yard score.

After a slow start, Arkansas State responded with a pair of quick touchdowns, sandwiched around Brandon Wright's 43-yard field goal, making the score 24-14 with just under five minutes remaining in the half.

From there, the teams exchanged touchdowns just before the half. Ellington drove the Panthers 75 yards for their fourth touchdown of the half, finding Pinckney in the corner of the end zone for an 11-yard scoring pass and a 31-14 lead with 1:39 to play in the half.

But the Red Wolves finished the half with Omar Bayless' 31-yard touchdown catch from Layne Hatcher, and the Panthers took a 31-21 lead into the locker room

The offensive firepower continued in the second half for both teams.

Bayless' third touchdown catch of the game pulled the Red Wolves within 38-35 with 10 minutes to play, but Ellington and the Panthers responded with a 75-yard touchdown drive, capped by a 1-yard run by Coates, to reestablish a 10-point advantage with 6:30 left.

Bayless, the nation's leading receiver, finished 154 yards on eight catches and three touchdown catches. Quarterback Layne Hatcher went 21-of-32 in the air for 299 yards and four touchdown passes.

GEORGIA STATE 31 COASTAL CAROLINA 21

Behind a career-high 128 yards rushing from senior quarterback Dan Ellington and a schoolrecord 350 yards on the ground, Georgia State earned a key Sun Belt Conference road victory at Coastal Carolina 31-21 Saturday night at Brooks Stadium.

After setting a school-record with 340 rushing yards last week, Georgia State (4-2, 2-1 Sun Belt) broke the record with 350 yards on the ground Saturday. It marked the first time in program history where three different rushers each went for more than 100 yards on the ground as Tra Barnett and Seth Paige joined Ellington with 100-yard games.

Ellington rushed 19 times for 128 yards, including a long of 57 yards, while also going



16-of-24 for 122 yards and a touchdown through the air. Barnett rushed 20 times for 110 yards and two touchdowns, while Paige added 104 yards on 13 carries including a touchdown.

The Georgia State defense held a potent Coastal Carolina rushing attack to just 105 yards and came up with several key plays, including two stops for no gain on 3rd-and-1 and 4th-and-1 at the GSU 8-yard line with three minutes left to seal the win.

"What a performance by our defense. They really rose to the occasion and stopped them on fourth down," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "I'm very proud of our football team and our coaching staff for winning this game. It's going to be a happy ride back to Atlanta."

Ellington also praised the defense, as well as his offensive line, which has paved the way for 690 yards rushing over the last two games.

"Credit to the defense for playing their butts off," he said. "And I've got to give it to those guys up front. Back to back weeks with 350 yards rushing – I can't thank them enough."

With his 128-yard effort, Ellington topped the 1,000-yard rushing mark for his career, raising his total to 1,066 yards on the ground.

The first 18 minutes of the game saw just three field goals as Coastal Carolina took a 6-3 lead with 12 minutes left in the second quarter. For GSU, Brandon Wright nailed a 38-yard field goal that was set up by Terry Thomas' fumble recovery at the CCU 44-yard line

Less than two minutes later, Georgia State took its first lead as the Panthers needed just four plays to move 75 yards, thanks to Seth Paige's 46-yard touchdown run down the left sideline. That put GSU ahead 10-6 with 10:46 to play in the first half.

The GSU defense forced a three-and-out, and the Panthers took over at their 30 and embarked on another touchdown drive. All but 15 of the 70 yards came on the ground. Tra Barnett had a key third-down conversion for a first down at the 20, and on 3rd-and-goal at the 3-yard line, Ellington threw a quick pass in the flat to Cornelius McCoy, who fought his way into the end zone for the score, giving the Panthers a 17-6 lead with 1:51 left in the first half.

Coastal Carolina took the opening kickoff of the second half and drove for a touchdown, but the Panthers responded with back to back scoring drives of 75 and 74 yards, both capped by Barnett runs, to take a 31-13 lead with two minutes left in the third quarter.

The Chanticleers cut the deficit to 10 points after converting a short field, the result of a poor punt, into a touchdown with 10 minutes to play. But Georgia State's special teams then came up with a big play as Keon Carter recovered a fumbled punt a the CCU 19, and then the defense made their late stand.

With two rushing touchdowns, covering 26 and two yards, Barnett raised his career total to 12 to move into a tie for second place in GSU history, just one behind the school record.

Dan Ellington threw the go-ahead, 8-yard touchdown pass to tight end Aubry Payne with 7:41 to play and the Georgia State defense made a fourthdown stop to seal the Panthers' third straight victory, 28-21 over Army on a rainy night in Georgia State Stadium.

After Payne's catch, his fifth touchdown of the season, and Roger Carter's two-point conversion catch put the Panthers (5-2) ahead, Army drove inside the GSU 30-yard line with under two minutes to play. On 3rd-and-4 at the 28, Remy Lazarus and Quavian White made a stop for no gain, and then on fourth down, White intercepted Army (3-4) quarterback Kelvin Hopkins Jr. near the goal line.

"The effort and toughness we had to go out there and beat this Army team was a joy to watch," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "I tried to tell them before the game when you face an offense like those guys present, it is going to be a tough and physical ball game.

"That Army bunch is a tough outfit. I am so glad to get that one behind us with a great victory, and I'm so proud our team and we are sitting here at 5-2."

Ellington passed for 232 yards and three touchdowns, while senior Tra Barnett rushed for 108 yards on 17 carries for his third straight 100-yard game, a first in Georgia State history. He also scored his 13th career rushing touchdown to tie the Panthers' career mark.

Leading the way for the Georgia State defense against Army's triple option was junior linebacker Trajan Stephens-McQueen, who set a school record with 20 tackles, including 10 solo stops. Lazarus had a fumble recovery and a key pass breakup, and noseguard Dontae Wilson added 10 tackles.

"Let's just talk about the entire defense," Elliott said. "That's such a tough offense to face, especially with only four days to prepare. The entire defense was phenomenal."

With the game tied at 14-14 at the half, Army drove 75 yards for a touchdown on its first possession of the second half. Georgia State responded with a 75-yard drive of its own, capped by Barnett's 1-yard scoring run. But a missed extra point left GSU trailing 21-20 late in the third quarter.

The GSU defense then forced a punt, and the Panthers took over at their own 19 to begin their game-winning drive. Ellington converted on 4th-and-1 at the GSU 28 with a 4-yard run and then the Payne for a 29-yard completion down to the Army 39. Four straight runs by Barnett gave GSU a first down at the 14, and then Ellington hit Jonathan Ifedi for six yards before the touchdown to Payne.

"That's a magician over there," Lazarus said, pointing to Ellington. "I don't know how he does what he does, but I'm glad he's on our team and not anybody else in the country's team. He comes to play every day in practice, and the guy you see in the game is the guy you see in practice every day."

Ellington connected with redshirt freshman Sam Pinckney for two touchdown yards in the first half, but Army answered with a pair of short touchdown runs by Sandon McCoy.

The Panthers first touchdown came on thEIR second possession, after Army tried a fake punt on 4th-and-8 from the GSU 43. Ellington needed just four plays for the touchdown, hitting Cornelius

McCoy from 24 yards out to put GSU up 7-0 midway through the first quarter.

Georgia State's second touchdown was set up by an Army turnover as Victor Heyward caused a fumble that Remy Lazarus recovered at the Army 46. Three plays later, Pinckney caught his second touchdown, this time from 24 yards, and GSU led 14-7 midway through the second quarter.

But Army drove 75 yards on 12 plays, chewing up 6:26 on the clock, before scoring with 1:15 left as the teams entered the locker room tied at 14-14.

Connor Slomka led Army with 10 rushes for 89 yards, while Sandon McCoy rushed 19 times for 71 yards

The Black Knights controlled the clock with more than 38 minutes of possession and went 6-of-8 on fourth down.



Tra Barnett rushed for 242 yards to set Georgia State records for rushing yards in a game, season and career and lead the Panthers to their fourth straight game and bowl eligibility for the third time in five years with a 52-33 victory over Troy Saturday night at Georgia State Stadium.

GSU piled up a school-record 390 yards rushing as a team, breaking the school record for the third time in four games. The Panthers (6-2, 3-1 Sun Belt) remained undefeated (4-0) at home this year while Troy fell to 3-4 and 1-2 in Sun Belt play.

"What a tremendous effort by our football team," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "Everyone is probably saying we are bowl eligible, but to tell you the truth, I do not want to even think about bowl eligibility. If we achieve what I think we can achieve in practice and preparation, we have a chance to go fight for this championship. I will challenge our football team. I want them to understand we have the capability to compete for it.

"As I sit here tonight, we have an opportunity to do so much more than go to a bowl game, that is why I am so proud."

Barnett's 242 yards shattered the school record of 201 yards by Russell vs. Rhode Island in 2012. He broke the record with a 41-yard touchdown run on 4th-and-1 with one minute to play to seal the victory.

In doing so, the senior from Elberton, Ga., became Georgia State's career rushing leader with 1,631 yards, passing Travis Evans (1,500, 2010-13). His two touchdowns give him sole possession of the GSU career record for rushing touchdowns with 15.

With 928 yards on the year, Barnett also broke the Georgia State single-season record previously held by Russell (747 in 2012).

"Talk about a guy who fought to get in that backfield," Elliott said. "To see him go out there and do those things, it makes our entire team smile. I think he is setting records that will last for a while,



and he is still not finished. He has a great group that helps him, our tight ends, our offensive line, our quarterback, our defense, and everyone. I am very proud of what he stands for, who he is, and how he comes to work."

Quarterback Dan Ellington accounted for four touchdowns, going 18-of-25 for 189 yards passing and two touchdowns while rushing 11 times for 32 yards and two scores.

Leading 28-14 at the half, Georgia State extended its lead on its first possession of the second half with an 80-yard drive that covered 16 plays and seven minutes on the clock as Ellington scored from one yard out to give GSU a 35-21 lead with four minutes to play in the third quarter.

After a Troy touchdown, Georgia State answered with Brandon Wright's 29-yard field goal. But the Trojans needed less than two minutes to score another touchdown and pull within 38-27 with nine minutes to play.

Ellington directed another long drive as the Panthers drove 75 yards on 13 plays for Roger Carter's 4-yard touchdown catch, eating up another five minutes to give GSU a 45-27 lead with 3:51 left.

Reggie Todd's 79-yard kickoff return set up another Troy touchdown, but the Panthers recovered the ensuing on-sides kick, and Barnett put an exclamation point on the win with a 41-yard touchdown run with 1:04 to play.

Georgia State opened the game with a 75-yard touchdown drive on its first possession, capped by Ellington's 19-yard touchdown run, to take a quick 7-0 lead four minutes into the game.

After Troy tied the score, the Panthers scored on back-to-back possessions. Ellington connected with tight end Aubry Payne, who caught a tipped ball over the middle and raced for the end zone for a 40-yard touchdown and a 14-7 lead with 10 minutes left in the second quarter. For Payne, that is his teamleading sixth touchdown catch in seven games.

The Panthers got a fourth-down stop and took over at their 35-yard line. On the first play, Paige took the handoff from Ellington and raced 65 yards, dragging tacklers into the end zone for the score. The sophomore running back has two of the five longest runs in school history; he set the GSU record with a 82-yard touchdown last season vs. ULM.

Leading 21-14, Ellington directed a nine-play, 75-yard touchdown drive, capped by Barnett's 5-yard scoring run, to take a 28-14 lead with 3:28 left in the half.

Twice in the first half after Troy drove into GSU territory, the Panther defense came up with third-down sacks by Terry Thomas and Victor Heyward to keep the Trojans off the scoreboard.

Despite a school-record 414 rushing yards, Georgia State fell on the road to ULM 45-31 at Malone Stadium on Saturday night, snapping the Panthers' four-game winning streak.

Tra Barnett rushed for 190 yards—the third-highest single-game total in school history--on 32 attempts for his fifth-straight 100-yard game and the seventh of his career, another GSU record. He became the first 1,000-yard rusher in school history and broke another GSU record by scoring his 10th touchdown of the season.

Georgia State (6-3, 3-2 Sun Belt) played without senior quarterback Dan Ellington in the second half after he sustained an injury with seconds to play in the first half. Ellington went 5-of-10 for 42 yards and rushed nine times for 91 yards and a touchdown in the first 30 minutes.

"It's a disappointing loss. We didn't make enough stops and we certainly didn't outscore them," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "We've got to get a lot of guys healthy. It was a tough game for us from an injury standpoint, but we've got a lot left to play for. We'll keep our heads high and push forward. I certainly don't fault the effort."

True freshman quarterback Cornelious Brown, pressed into service for his first significant action of the season, came in and passed for 80 yards in the second half while rushing twice for 14 yards.

"Ultimately, he's going to be a fantastic quarterback, but when you get thrown into the fire like that without a whole lot of game reps, there's going to be some good and bad," Elliott said. "He did everything he could tonight, and I was proud of him."

Sophomore Destin Coates rushed eight times for 109 yards, his first 100-yard game as GSU had multiple 100-yard rushers for the third time this season. Coates is the fourth different Panther to top the century mark this season.

With 414 yards on the ground, the Panthers broke their school record for the fourth time in the last five games.

ULM quarterback Caleb Evans was 24-of-32 for 291 yards and three touchdowns. Josh Johnson led the Warhawks (4-5, 3-2 Sun Belt) on the ground with 168 yards and two touchdowns.

"We've got to play better defensively," Elliott said.
"They're a fantastic offensive football team, but we couldn't tackle tonight and didn't have an answer for about anything they did."

The first half featured 48 points and eight lead changes as the teams alternated scores, beginning with Brandon Wright's 39-yard field goal on Georgia State's first possession and ending with Jared Porter's 31-yard field for ULM that tied the game at 24-24 with 43 seconds left in the half.

In between, Georgia State scored touchdowns on a 37-yard run by Coates, a 40-yard run by Ellington and a 1-yard plunge by Barnett.

Each team scored a touchdown in the third quarter to tie the score at 31-31 before ULM took the lead for good midway through the fourth quarter.

The Panthers had one last chance, taking over at their own 27 with 5:57 left but turned the ball over on downs, and ULM scored for the final 45-31 margin.

Georgia State fell 56-27 to No. 24 Appalachian State Saturday night at Georgia State Stadium in the first visit by a nationally-ranked opponent to the Panthers' home field.

Quarterback Dan Ellington, who sustained a knee injury in last week's game, gave the Panthers (6-4, 3-3 Sun Belt) a lift with his presence and led helped Georgia State to a 21-7 lead late in the first half, but App State scored 28 straight points to take a 35-21 lead into the locker room.

"What a great opportunity for us to come in here and play against a great football team," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "I thought the first 26 minutes of the first half were a great contest. It was a battle. You have 14 crazy points that take a 21-21 game and turn it into a 14-point lead going into halftime. We really could not recover."

Destin Coates led the Panthers with 97 rushing yards on seven attempts and a touchdown, while Tra Barnett rushed 17 times for 90 yards.

Ellington, with limited mobility, went 12-of-27 for 88 yards through the air, but was limited to two rushes for minus-7 yards.

"As disappointed as I am talking to you about the outcome of that game, we all witnessed something tonight that was incredible," Elliott said. "I hope you paid attention.

"For Dan Ellington to take the field tonight and do the things he did was extraordinary, nothing short of amazing what that young man did. He didn't do it for himself. It was not selfish. He did it for the guys in the locker room and for the coaching staff. It is truly a testament to who that man is."

App State (9-1, 5-1 Sun Belt) quarterback Zac Thomas threw for 256 yards and four touchdowns, three of them caught by Corey Sutton. Darrynton Evans rushed for 131 yards on 18 carries to lead the Mountaineers, who are ranked No. 24 in the coaches' poll and No. 25 in the CFP rankings.

Georgia State started the scoring on its second possession of the game as Ellington drove the Panthers 84 yards on nine plays, highlighted by Tra Barnett's 44-yard run down to the 15-yard line. Four plays later, on 3rd down, Ellington hit Gentry with a swing pass for a 4-yard touchdown and a 7-0 lead with eight minutes left in the first half.

After App State tied the game, the Panthers scored twice in less than a minute.

First, Coates broke through the middle for a 67-yard touchdown run, the Panthers' longest run of the season and the fourth-longest run in GSU history.

On App State's ensuing possession, sophomore safety Chris Bacon intercepted Thomas and returned it 34 yards for Georgia State's first defensive touchdown of the season and a 21-7 lead with 1:38 to play in the first quarter.

With the game tied at 21 late in the first half, App State scored two touchdowns off Ellington interceptions, both by cornerback Shaun Jolly. Jolly returned the first pick 30 yards for a touchdown, and then his second one set up Evans' 1-yard TD with 33 seconds left in the half, giving the Mountaineers a 35 21 lead.



Tra Barnett rushed for 128 yards and a touchdown and the Georgia State defense turned in a strong performance in a 28-15 victory over South Alabama on Senior Day at Georgia State Stadium, giving the Panthers (7-4, 4-3 Sun Belt) seven victories in the regular season for the first time in the program's 10-year history.

With the win, Georgia State finished with a program-best 5-1 record at Georgia State Stadium.

"First, I would like to say how proud I am of the football team and the 19 seniors who took the field tonight," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "It is amazing to think that we are sitting here with our seventh win. Seven wins have never been accomplished in the regular season at Georgia State University in ten years of football. We just did it. That is making history.





"There are a couple of things you remember. You always remember the first game you play, the last game you play, and you always remember Senior Day," Elliott continued. "They (the seniors) are going to remember this one. They set another standard. They have an opportunity to set another notch next week and the following."

Barnett, the senior from Elberton, Ga., recorded his seventh 100-yard game of the season and scored his 11th touchdown, both school records. In doing so, he topped the 2,000-yard mark for career rushing, another program first. He now has 2,039 yards.

Quarterback Dan Ellington, playing through a knee injury, completed 21 of 27 passes for 208 yards and two touchdowns. He also ran four times for 12 yards.

His top target today was tight end Roger Carter, who had career highs with seven receptions and 87 yards, including a 4-yard TD.

The GSU defense turned in one of its best performances of the season, holding the Jaguars to 326 yards of offense. Both touchdowns that South Alabama managed came in the final six minutes after GSU began playing backups.

Leading 14-3 at the half, Georgia State pulled away with back-to-back touchdown drives in the third quarter. First, Barnett capped a 75-yard march with a 2-yard scoring plunge to give the Panthers a 21-3 lead with six minutes left in the third quarter.

After the GSU defense forced a three-and-out, the Panthers took over at their 24 and drove 76 yards on 10 plays, capped by Carter's TD. The junior tight end caught a pass in the flat and bulled his way into the end zone for a 28-3 advantage early in the fourth quarter.

South Alabama took the kickoff and drove down the field for a first down at the GSU 15. But four plays netted eight yards as senior defensive end Terry Thomas came up with the fourth-down stop at the GSU 7 that effectively sealed the win.

After an early South Alabama field goal, Georgia State got on the board early in the second quarter

with a 13-play, 82-yard drive. Destin Coates ended the march with a 6-yard scoring run to put the Panthers up 7-3 with 13 minutes to play in the half.

On South Alabama's ensuing possession, the GSU defense forced the Jaguars to turn the ball over on downs, the Panthers took over at their own 35-yard line. Ellington directed a 9-play, 65-yard drive, capped by a 5-yard touchdown pass to Devin Gentry, who made a leaping catch in traffic in the corner of the end zone. That gave Georgia State a 14-3 led with six minutes left in the half.

Georgia State fell in its regular-season finale, 38-10, at Georgia Southern at Paulson Stadium.

With seven victories, Georgia State (7-5, 4-4 Sun Belt) is bowl-eligible for the third time in five years.

Senior quarterback Dan Ellington, battling a knee injury for the third-straight game, went 18-for-27 for 182 yards for the Panthers.

Senior running back Tra Barnett, who became the first Panther to rush for 2,000 career yards one game ago, led Georgia State on the ground with 15 rushes for 53 yards and his 12th touchdown of the season, while sophomore Destin Coates rushed four times for 54 yards.

Senior Brandon Wright booted his 31st career field goal with a 35-yard kick in the third quarter, tying him with current New Orleans Saints' kicker Wil Lutz for the GSU career record.

Georgia State opened the scoring with a nineplay, 86-yard touchdown drive, capped by Barnett's 15-yard scoring run, giving the Panthers a 7-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

Georgia Southern (7-5, 5-3 Sun Belt) responded with a touchdown on its next possession on its way to a 17-7 halftime lead.

The Eagles continued to apply pressure to the Georgia State defense with two more touchdowns in the third and one more in the fourth quarter en route to a second-straight win over the Panthers. The two teams have now split six all-time meetings, but Georgia State lost for the first time in three games in Statesboro

"We had a hard time protecting Dan, and once we got behind, we didn't have the opportunity to stay with the game plan and run the football," head coach Shawn Elliott said.

"It's very tough to lose like that. We're not playing with all our cards, but that's not an excuse," Elliott continued. "We came here to win the game, and we're disappointed with the way it turned out. But a lot of good things happened in this regular season, and we've got another ballgame to play so we can finish strong

"We're playing with a gutsy group of guys. I'm not proud of the outcome of course, but I'm very proud of the effort. We'll learn from these struggles and push forward and get better."

Junior quarterback Shai Werts led Georgia Southern's offense, going 7-of-10 through the air for 73 yards, while adding 15 rushes for 55 yards and a touchdown. The Eagles finished the game rushing for 279 yards, led by J.D. King with 107 yards on 16 touches.

Georgia State fell 38-17 to Wyoming in the NOVA Home Loans Arizona Bowl on New Year's Eve afternoon at Arizona Stadium.

Playing in their third bowl game in the last five years, the Panthers finished the season at 7-6.

"What an extraordinary senior class we have who took this field and fought to the very, very end," head coach Shawn Elliott said. "We just didn't play the ballgame the way we needed to play to win – a lot of mishaps from us as coaches and players. Hats off to Wyoming.

"I'm extremely proud of this football team and the steps they took to make this program worthy to come out to this bowl game and compete. This isn't just a one or two-time occurrence. We're going to be here for a while, and we've got a lot to keep building on.

"This is a disappointing loss," Elliott continued. "As a coach or a player, you fight like hell every single day to prepare your football team to win. We didn't make the plays to win today, but we're going to work hard and get better."

In his final game in a Georgia State uniform, senior quarterback Dan Ellington went 13-for-26 for 156 yards and a touchdown through the air, while rushing 14 times for 70 yards and a touchdown.

With 355 yards of total offense, Georgia State broke its season record, collecting 5,718 yards to surpass the previous record of 5,627 yards set in 2015. GSU had already set new season records for points, touchdowns, rushing yards and rushing touchdowns.

Ellington led the Panthers down the field for

a touchdown on their opening possession with a 6-play, 75-yard drive. He completed a 23-yard pass to Devin Gentry and Tra Barnett had a 7-yard run, but Ellington picked up the rest of the yardage on the ground, despite playing with a torn ACL in his right knee. He had a 29-yard gain down to the 20-yard line and scored on a 4-yard run, his first rushing touchdown since the injury, to give the Panthers a 7-0 lead just two minutes into the game.

"I'm thankful I was part of this program," Ellington said. "To the fans, I want to say thank you for believing in me. Thank you for cheering on a guy from Mississippi and having me as your family."

Wyoming took a 17-7 lead with two touchdowns in the final two minutes of the first quarter, both set up by Panther miscues in their own territory, first a failed fourth-down attempt and then an interception. The Cowboys added a 51-yard touchdown pass in the final seconds of the first half to take a 24-10 lead into the locker room.

Senior Brandon Wright kicked a 25-yard field goal in the second quarter for the 32nd field goal of his career to break Wil Lutz's Georgia State career record. Those three points also gave Wright the GSU season scoring record, surpassing Iain Vance's 80 points in the inaugural season of 2010; Wright finished with 84 points.

Wright, Gentry and senior left tackle Hunter Atkinson played in their 49th career game, tying the school record held by several players.

Barnett, who became Georgia State's all-time leading rusher earlier this season, finished with 15 carries for 64 yards.

Georgia State's receiving corps was led by Cornelius McCoy, who had five catches for 78 yards, including a 44-yard touchdown.

Wyoming (8-5) was led by freshman quarterback Levi Williams who went 11-for-26 for 234 yards and a touchdown. On the ground Xazavian Valladay rushed 26 times for 204 yards and a touchdown and was the game's Offensive MVP.

The difference in the game might have been on third down where the Panthers managed to go just 3-of-13, while Wyoming was 11-of-17. The Cowboys twice stopped Georgia State on fourth down in the red zone.

Georgia State saw 19 seniors play in their final game with many having played in two bowl games. Four seniors (Khai Anderson, Hunter Atkinson, Ed Curney and Brandon Wright) were part of all three GSU bowl teams.

"It's really remarkable what this team has overcome," Elliott said. "I'm proud to be their coach."

FIRST**BOWL**GAME 2015 AutoNation Cure Bowl

San Jose State 27, Georgia State 16 Dec. 19, 2015 • Orlando, Fla.



The first bowl game in Georgia State history was a trip to the inaugural AutoNation Cure Bowl in Orlando, Fla., as the program earned a bowl berth in just its sixth year of existence and second at the FBS level.

To reach their first post-season game, the Panthers had to recover from a 2-6 start and win their final four games. The winning streak began with a convincing 41-19 victory at Texas State and continued with home wins over South Alabama and Troy. The underdog Panthers then capped the regular season with a dominating 34-7 victory at rival Georgia Southern for their bowl-clinching sixth victory.



Against San Jose State, Georgia State's late rally fell short as the Panthers lost 27-16.

Sun Belt Player of the Year Nick Arbuckle was held to just 14-of-29 passing for 208 yards and two touchdowns but still finished the season with a Sun Belt Conference single-season record of 4,368 yards.

With Georgia State trailing 13-7 early in the fourth quarter, Wil Lutz uncorked a 70-yard punt that rolled inside the SJSU 5, and the Panther defense forced a three-and-out. On the Spartans punt from the end zone,

a poor snap gave GSU a safety, pulling the Panthers within 13-9 with 12:44 left.

After the free kick and a 24-yard return by Donovan Harden, the Panthers took over at the SJSU 36. Arbuckle hit freshman tight end Ari Werts for a first down at the 20, and two plays later Todd Boyd caught a short pass and raced 19 yards for the score. That gave Georgia State its first lead at 16-13 with 10:46 left.

But San Jose State regained the lead with a quick touchdown on a 42-yard touchdown run by quarterback Kenny Potter, moving the Spartans back in front, 20-16, with nine minutes to go.

Georgia State moved to midfield but failed to convert a 3rd-and-one with eight minutes left. The Panthers went for it on fourth down, and freshman receiver Penny Hart got behind the defense, but Arbuckle's pass was just out of his reach.

The Spartans took over and held the ball for more than five minutes before scoring the clinching touchdown for the final margin.

2017 AutoNation Cure Bowl

Georgia State 27, Western Kentucky 17 Dec. 16, 2017 • Orlando, Fla.



Led by Most Valuable Player Conner Manning and a recordsetting effort by the defense, Georgia State earned the first bowl victory in school history with a 27-17 win over Western Kentucky in the AutoNation Cure Bowl at Camping World Stadium.

The win gave the Panthers their school-record seventh victory of the season under first-year head coach Shawn Elliott and secured their first winning season as an FBS program.

"We're just a bunch of misfit players and misfit coaches who are blue collar, work hard and love one other and look at us," Elliott said. "First bowl win, most wins in school history - I'm damn proud to be a Georgia State Panther, I know that!

Manning, the senior signal-caller, completed 20 of 28 passes for 276 yards and one touchdown while directing a GSU offense that also rushed for 143 yards. Georgia State accomplished that while essentially playing without top weapon Penny Hart, who was battling an ankle injury and was limited to a handful of snaps.

"Coming into this season, my only goal was to lead this team to a bowl victory," Manning said as he accepted the MVP award.

The Georgia State defense limited Western Kentucky's highpowered offense to 349 yards. With six sacks, including two by senior Mackendy Cheridor, the Panthers set a school record by holding WKU to a net of minus-two yards rushing.

Leading 13-10, the Panthers used a flea flicker to take a 10-point lead in the third quarter. After two flips, Manning got the ball back and found freshman tight end Roger Carter all alone down the left sideline for a 42-yard touchdown and a 20-10 advantage with 5:55 left in the third quarter. The score was set up by Hart's lone catch of the game, a spectacular 27-yard grab at the WKU 42-yard line.

In the fourth quarter, the Panthers effectively sealed the game with a 16-play, 74-yard drive that lasted nine minutes. The drive started after Jerome Smith's interception, and Kyler Neal tallied the clinching score on a 1-yard run to put GSU ahead 27-10 with 5:50 to play.

Georgia State scored on its opening possession on Brandon Wright's 42-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

Then the teams traded quick touchdowns on a total of just five plays. First, WKU needed just two plays to score, including White's 54-yard touchdown pass to Deon Yelder.

But the Panthers' answer was almost as quick. Devin Gentry rushed for 10 yards, and then Manning found Tamir Jones down the left sideline for 49 yards to the WKU 26. On the next play, Demarcus Kirk broke through the middle of the line and rambled 26 yards for the score to regain the lead at 10-7 with 6:19 left in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, the teams exchanged field goals as Wright's second three-pointer, this one from 37 yards, gave GSU a 13-10 lead it would take into the locker room.

Junior linebacker Chase Middleton recovered a fumble and returned it 19 yards and also had a sack and an interception. Mackendy Cheridor forced a fumble along with his two sacks.

Redshirt freshman Jonathan Ifedi had career highs of six catches for 56 yards, while Carter had four catches for 85 yards. Glenn Smith rushed for 73 yards on 23 carries.

2019 NOVA Home Loans Arizona Bowl

Wyoming 38, Georgia State 17 Dec. 31, 2019 • Tucson, Ariz.



Playing in its third bowl game in the last five years, Georgia State fell 38-17 to Wyoming in the NOVA Home Loans Arizona Bowl on New Year's Eve afternoon at Arizona Stadium.

In his final game in a Georgia State uniform, senior quarterback Dan Ellington went 13-for-26 for 156 yards and one touchdown while rushing 14 times for 70 yards and another score.

Ellington led the Panthers down the field for a touchdown on their opening possession with a 6-play, 75-yard drive. He completed a 23-yard pass to Devin Gentry and Tra Barnett had a 7-yard run, but Ellington picked up the rest of the yardage on the ground, despite playing with a torn ACL in his right knee. He had a 29-yard gain down to the 20-yard line and scored on a 4-yard run, his first rushing touchdown since the injury, to give the Panthers a 7-0 lead just two minutes into the game.

Wyoming took a 17-7 lead with two touchdowns in the final two minutes of the first quarter, both set up by Panther miscues in their own territory, first a failed fourth-down attempt and then an interception. The Cowboys added a 51-yard touchdown pass in late in the first half to take a 24-10 lead into the locker room.

Senior Brandon Wright kicked a 25-yard field goal in the second quarter for the 32nd field goal of his career to break Wil Lutz's Georgia State career record. Those three points also gave Wright the GSU season scoring record with 84 points.

Barnett, Georgia State's all-time leading, finished with 15 carries for 64 yards.

Georgia State's receiving corps was led by Cornelius McCoy, who had five catches for 78 yards, including a 44-yard touchdown.

Wyoming was led by freshman quarterback Levi Williams who went 11-for-26 for 234 yards and a touchdown. On the ground Xazavian Valladay rushed 26 times for 204 yards and a touchdown and was the game's Offensive MVP.

The difference in the game might have been on third down where the Panthers managed to go just 3-of-13, while Wyoming was 11-of-17. The Cowboys twice stopped Georgia State on fourth down in the red zone.

Georgia State saw 19 seniors play in their final game with many having played in two bowl games. Four seniors (Khai Anderson, Hunter Atkinson, Ed Curney and Brandon Wright) were part of all three GSU bowl teams.
